

The Saint Mary's baseball team and sophomore Joe Seegers (Oconomowoc, Wis. / Homeschool) certainlystarted the 2016 season off on the right foot last week. The

Cardinals went 7-1 last week on their spring trip to Winter Haven, Fla., and Seegers batted .438 (14-for-32)



The Cardinals opened the season with a loss to Augustana, but then reeled off seven-straight wins, with Seegers catching fire over the last six. In the last six games of the week, he had five multi-hit games, three three-hit games and he batted .583 with all nine of his runs and all six of his RBI. Sunday, he capped his big week with a two-out game-winning single to right to give the Cardinals a 4-3 walk-off win over Franklin. Seegers finished with a .513 on-base percentage and a .500 slugging percentage in his first week of the season.

Thanks to the hot start, Saint Mary's opened its season 7-1, and is now 7-2 after a 6-3 loss to Mount Union earlier on Monday. The team finished up the trip with a second game against the Purple Raiders Monday afternoon, and then will take a few weeks off before traveling to Illinois to take on Aurora, Wheaton and Cornell on March 18-19. Saint Mary's will host its first game in Winona on March 29 when St. Scholastica comes to town for a nonconference doubleheader.

The Concordia baseball team got a stellar collegiate debut from pitcher Fletcher Andel (Oxbow, N.D.) during its season-opening trip to Florida. The rookie righty dazzled in his first college start, throwing seven hitless and scoreless innings to earn his first Cobber win with a gem against Lyndon State. For his performance, the MIAC sports information directors honored Andel Monday with the first MIAC Baseball Pitcher-of-the-Week award.

Andel made his collegiate debut on Feb. 21 with two innings (four hits, three runs, three walks, one strikeout) in a 10-4 loss in Augustana, but it turned out he was just getting warmed up for his first career start. He took the mound on Friday against Lyndon State and hurled an absolute gem. He didn't allow a hit or a run in seven near-perfect innings, with seven strikeouts and three walks. His team held on for the 5-3, nine-inning win, to give Andel a memorable first collegiate victory. Thus far in 2016, he is 1-0 with a 3.00 ERA, with three runs,

four hits, six walks and eight strikeouts in nine innings.

Andel's near-perfect debut start was one of the highlights of a strong opening week for the Cobbers. Concordia went 6-4 on its 10-game trip to Winter Haven and Auburndale, Fla. The team will take nearly a month off before taking on Carroll, Wheaton and Edgewood on March 25-26 in Carol Stream, Ill., and then the Cobbers will host their home opener when Jamestown visits Moorhead, Minn., on March 28.



It certainly didn't take Hamline's Jacob Picht (Oakdale, Minn. / Tartan) long to heat up in 2016. The Pipers' junior first baseman got at least two hits in each of the Pipers' first four games over the

weekend in Tucson, Ariz., with a .588 batting average (10-for-17), nine runs, seven RBI, three doubles and a



triple. He recorded an .882 slugging percentage and a .682 on-base percentage as Hamline split the four games. For his performance, the MIAC sports information directors honored Picht Monday with the Baseball Player-of-the-Week award.

Picht was 2-for-5 with two runs and two RBI in a 15-0 season-opening win over Marian Saturday, then was a bright spot with a 3-for-3 day with another RBI and two walks later that day in a 17-5 loss to Whitman. He had three hits again the next day, as he went 3-for-5 with four runs and two doubles in an 11-10 loss to Marian, then drove in four runs and scored three times while going 2-for-4 in a 29-14 win over Wesleyan. Picht didn't strike out in 21 plate appearances, and ranks in the top five in the MIAC in batting, on-base percentage and slugging percentage.

Alex Bauermeister, Hamline Andover, Minn. / St. Francis



After a slow two-game start to the 2016 season, both the Saint John's University baseball team and junior Derek Schiebel (Apple Valley, Minn. / Eastview) caught

fire to close out their first week of action on the team's spring trip to Tucson, Ariz. SJU won three of its last four



games to even its record, and Schiebel ended up hitting .345 (10-for-29) with two home runs, two triples, a double, six runs scored and 12 RBI. For his performance the MIAC sports information directors honored Schiebel Monday with the MIAC Baseball Player-of-the-Week award.

Schiebel went just 1-for-11 over the first two games of 2016, and Saint John's lost both before both reversed their fortunes in a big way. Over the next four, Schiebel hit the cover off the ball, going 9-for-18 (.500) with two homers, a triple and 12 RBI. He hit both homers and had eight RBI in a March 11 doubleheader sweep of Wheaton. A right-handed hitter, Schiebel batted .474 (9-for-19) against fellow righties and .462 (6-for-13) with runners in scoring position. Thus far, the Johnnie junior leads the MIAC in triples, home runs and RBI and is third in total bases (21) and slugging percentage (.724).

After one week of play, Saint John's is exactly .500 at 3-3. The team has one more trip South, as Schiebel and company will head to Fort Meyers, Fla., to play 10 games from March 20 to March 25. The team will host UM-Morris in its home opener on March 30, then will welcome Hamline to Collegeville for the MIAC opener on April 2.

The Scots' starter tossed a three-hit gem in his first 2016 outing to help his team complete a sweep of Southern Vermont Sunday in Tucson, Ariz. For his performance the MIAC sports information directors honored Thomas Monday with the MIAC Baseball Pitcher-of-the-Week award.

Thomas didn't waste any time setting the tone for 2016, with a brilliant season debut in Sunday's 5-1 victory over Southern Vermont. The junior threw six stellar innings, as he allowed just one earned run on three hits and three walks while striking out five. He also handled his only chance in the field cleanly in Sunday's win. After just one start, Thomas' 1.50 earned run average ranks sixth in the MIAC. His average of

7.50 strikeouts per game ranks 10th and opposing hitters are managing just a .136 batting average against him, with is the fourth-best mark in the MIAC.

The strong start by Thomas helped the Scots move above .500 in the early part of 2016 with a 2-1 overall record. The team continues its trip to Tucson this week with seven games - one each Monday, Wednesday and Friday and doubleheaders on Thursday and Saturday. Macalester will then return home for its home opener at the end of the month, when it hosts UW-Superior on March 30. The Scots host Carleton in the MIAC opener on April 2.




huge role in the Scots' success, as he hit .647 with 11 RBI, five runs, three doubles and three walks, with a



.714 on-base percentage and an .824 slugging percentage in five games. For his performance the MIAC sports information directors honored Brantner Monday with the MIAC Baseball Player-of-the-Week award.

Brantner was brilliant with the bat, as he hit safely in all five games, and had at least two hits in four of the five. He was 2-for-3 with three RBI in a 16-1 win over Dubuque, 3-for-4 with two doubles, two runs and four RBI in an 8-7 win over Wesleyan, 2-for-4 with a run and two RBI in a 9-6 win over UW-Superior and 3-for-4 with two RBI, two runs and a double in a 9-3 win over Caltech. This season, Brantner is hitting .600 with seven runs and 12 RBI to go along with a .655 on-base percentage and a .720 slugging percentage. He's fielding at a 1.000 percent clip thus far, and has thrown out three of five potential base stealers.

Thanks to the great week, Macalester improved to 8-2 on the young season, and has won eight of its last nine games. The Scots will take about 10 days off following the completion of their Arizona adventure, and will host their first home doubleheader of the season when they welcome UW-Superior to St. Paul for a 2 p.m. first pitch on March 30. The Piper sophomore threw a complete-game, two-hit shutout to help his team beat Carthage, 5-0, and he has yet to allow a run in his first two 2016 starts. For his performance the MIAC sports information directors honored Bauermeister Monday with his second MIAC Baseball Pitcher-of-the-Week award of the young season.

Bauermeister was brilliant yet again in his second outing of 2016, as he threw 102 pitches in the seveninning, complete-game shutout. The Hamline starter took a no-hitter into the sixth inning and allowed a Carthage runner to reach second base just twice in the game. He recorded at least one strikeout in each inning, and struck out the side in the seventh to finish the game with a serious exclamation point. He finished

with 11 strikeouts against just two walks and two hits over his seven innings. The win helped Bauermeister improve to 2-0 with a perfect, MIAC-leading ERA of 0.00. Opponents are hitting just 0.93 off him, also tops in the MIAC, and his 11.08 strikeouts per game also leads the league.

The Pipers were 2-1 over the weekend to start their spring trip, and improved to 4-3 overall in 2016. The trip to Tucson continues this week with a doubleheader against Williams Monday, two games against Buena Vista Tuesday, a single game vs. DePauw Thursday and a doubleheader against Oberlin Friday. The Carleton baseball team was in Tucson, Ariz., last week in search of warmer weather, but the hottest thing on the Knights' spring break trip was the bat of senior star Hayden Tsutsui (Northridge, Calif. /

Chatsworth). The Carleton catcher batted .560 (14-for-25) with 11 runs, 5 RBI, four doubles, a triple and a



home run in six games, and finished the week by hitting for the cycle against Carthage. For his performance the MIAC sports information directors honored Tsutsui Monday with the MIAC Baseball Player-of-the-Week award.

Tsutsui hit safely in all six games, with four multi-hit efforts and he had at least three hits in half of his appearances. His crowning achievement was Friday's cycle against Carthage, which is the first cycle at Carleton in more than a decade. He went 4-for-4 with a run and three RBI with a single, double, triple and home run. He also went 3-for-3 with two runs and a double against Oberlin and scored five runs in a 3-for-4 performance in a 21-10 win over Colby. Six of his 14 hits went for extra bases to give him a .920 slugging percentage last week, and he drew three walks to help his .621 on-base percentage. Behind the plate, he threw out 5-of-7 potential base stealers, meaning he had more steals himself (three) than he allowed (two) in five games behind the plate.

The Knights' catcher is one game short of qualifying for the MIAC leader board thus far in 2016, but his .558 batting average and .621 slugging percentage would lead the league, and his 11 extra-base hits and .612 on-base percentage would rank second. Despite Tsutsui's off-the-charts week with the bat, Carleton went just 1-5 and is now 2-14 overall in 2016. The Knights were back in action Monday afternoon with a nonconference game at Bethany Lutheran College that started at 3 p.m., and the team will open MIAC play Saturday with a 1 p.m. doubleheader in St. Paul, Minn., at Macalester.





He's got 18 RBI, 11 runs scored, two home runs and six doubles in 16 games.





He was even better Saturday against Carleton, which entered with a 5-0 MIAC record. Heitmann tossed a complete-game, six-hit shutout in a 7-0 win, with six

strikeouts and no walks to give the Knights their first conference loss. This season, Heitmann is 2-3 in eight appearances (six starts) with the MIAC's seventh-best ERA (3.86). He leads the MIAC in innings pitched (46.2) and shutouts (one), is ranked third in complete games (two) and ranks fifth in both strikeouts (45) and strikeouts per game (8.68).

After going 2-3 last week, Bethel is now 15-13 overall and an even .500 at 5-5 in the MIAC. The Royals are currently in a three-way tie for fifth, and tied with the two third-place teams in the win column. This week, Heitmann and company have one MIAC doubleheader and one nonconference game on the schedule. Bethel will head to CHS Field Wednesday to take on Hamline in a 2:30 p.m. conference twin bill, and Sunday the team will host a rematch with St. Scholastica at 1 p.m.




MIAC Baseball Playerof-the-Week

Willie Doll, Saint Mary's Amherst, Wis. / Amherst

The Saint Mary's baseball team and senior Willie Doll (Amherst, Wis.) both had a red-hot week in a pair of MIAC doubleheaders. The Cardinals went 3-1, with the only loss coming by a single run, while Doll hit

.733 (11-for-15) with a pair of four-hit games and 10 runs scored, five RBI, two home runs, two triples, two



walks, a double and six stolen bases. Doll's on-base percentage was .789, and he slugged at a clip of 1.467. For his performance the MIAC sports information directors honored Doll Monday with the MIAC Baseball Player-of-the-Week award.

Doll was brilliant with the bat all week, starting with a 4-for-5 performance Thursday with a run and a stolen base in a 6-5 loss to Augsburg. He helped Saint Mary's return the favor in a big way with a two-run walk-off home run to cap a two homer game with three RBI and three runs in a dramatic 7-5 win. Saturday, Doll just missed the cycle in a 13-7 win over Macalester, as he went 4-for-4 with four runs, two RBI, two stolen bases, two singles, a double and a triple. He was 1-for-3 with two runs and two more steals in a 6-4 win to complete the sweep of the Scots. This season, Doll leads the MIAC in stolen bases (21), he's second in hits (54) and total bases (78), third in batting average (.432) and also in the top 10 in runs (32), triples (3), home runs (4), on-base percentage (.514) and slugging percentage (.624) in overall games.

Thanks to the 3-1 week, Saint Mary's improved to 20-12-1 overall this season, and they moved to 8-6 in the crowded MIAC standings. The Cardinals are currently alone in fourth place, with just four games separating spots two through nine in the standings. of key MIAC doubleheaders. The 1B/Pitcher had another huge week at the plate, batting .500 (7-for-14) with



seven RBI, three runs scored, a home run and his 18th double of the season, which is a new Johnnie single-season record. For his performance the MIAC sports information directors honored Strey Monday with his second MIAC Baseball Player-of-the-Week award of the season.

Strey and company opened the week with huge sweep of No. 8/11-ranked St. Thomas. In addition to pitching the team to a 4-1 win in the first game, the Johnnie senior went 1-for-2 with a walk, a double, a run scored and two RBI. His two-run double gave SJU a 2-0 lead in game one, and he belted a three-run home run in the first inning of the second game to propel Saint John's to an 8-7 win. He was 2-for-4 with a walk, two runs scored and three RBI as his team completed the sweep. Strey followed that up by going 4-for-8 with two RBI in a split at Bethel Saturday. This season, his 45 RBI lead the MIAC and are the third-most in a single season in SJU history. He also ranks in the top 10 in the MIAC in hitting (.417, seventh), home runs (five, second), total bases (90, first), runs scored (35, sixth), slugging (.709, fourth) and on-base percentage (.513, sixth).



The Saint Mary's baseball team wrapped up the regular season in style last week, going 3-1 in a pair of MIAC doubleheaders and locking up a second-


place finish and its fourth trip to the MIAC Playoffs in the last five years. Junior outfielder Bob Kinne's bat was a



big reason for the Cardinals' success last week, as he batted .563 (9-for-16) with eight RBI, five runs scored, two home runs and a double, and he hit safely in all four games with three multi-hit performances. For his performance the MIAC sports information directors honored Kinne Monday with the final MIAC Baseball Player-of-the-Week award of the season.

Kinne helped the Cards lock up their postseason bid Wednesday by going 4-for-8 with three runs and homer and four RBI in a huge sweep of Concordia. He was especially good in game two, going 3-for-4 with two runs, a home run and all four RBI. He may have been even better Sunday against Bethel, as he went 5-for-8 with two runs, a double, another home run and four more RBI in a split, which including another three-hit, four-RBI game with a homer in game two. This season, Kinne's 44 RBI rank second in the MIAC, his six home runs and 91 total bases rank third and his 13 doubles and .641 slugging percentage both rank fifth. He enters the Playoffs hitting .380 with a .444 on-base percentage.

Thanks to the 3-1 week, the Cardinals improved to 25-13-1 and finished the regular season with a 13-7 MIAC record. Saint Mary's tied for second in the conference standings with Saint John's and Hamline. Due to tiebreaker criteria, the Cardinals will be the No. 4 seed in the MIAC Playoffs, and will open the postseason against No. 1-seeded St. Thomas Thursday at Saint John's Becker Park in Collegeville, Minn., at 7 p.m. The four-team, double-elimination tournament will run Thursday, Friday and Saturday in Collegeville and Cold Spring, Minn.

The Gustavus baseball team swept a pair of MIAC doubleheaders against the last two conference champions to push its winning streak to six in a row. Senior pitcher Jacob Volness (Cokato, Minn. / Howard Lake-Waverly-Winsted) came up big on the mound to earn a win in each series, as he went 2-0 with a 1.80 ERA, with just two earned runs allowed in 10 innings on five hits and two walks with five strikeouts. For his performance the MIAC sports information directors honored Volness Monday with the final MIAC Baseball Pitcher-of-the-Week award of the season.

Volness began his week with a gem in his final career MIAC start. He threw a two-hit complete game to lead Gustavus to a 5-2 win over 2015 MIAC champ Bethel, with just one earned run allowed and one walk. He struck out three, and faced just five batters more than the minimum. Saturday, he came out of the bullpen to earn

another win, as the Gusties rallied to beat 2016 MIAC champ St. Thomas for the first time in eight tries, and for the first time at UST in nine years. Volness worked the final three innings of the 6-5 comeback win, allowing one run on three hits with one walk and two Ks.

This season, Volness is 5-3 overall and 4-1 in MIAC play. His 3.26 ERA is ranked sixth in the MIAC and he's second in innings pitched (66.1), third in complete games (three), sixth in wins (five), and eighth in strikeouts (45). Thanks to last week's sweeps, Gustavus moved above the .500 mark at 20-18 overall, and finished the conference season 9-11, tied with Augsburg and Bethel for sixth place in the MIAC standings. Tuesday, Volness and company will wrap up the team's 2016 season - the first under new Head Coach Brad Baker - with a 1 p.m. nonconference doubleheader at UW-Superior.
