2016 MIAC Softball Conference Preview

BLOOMINGTON, Minn. -- There was definitely a changing-of-the-guard in the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) in 2015, as Bethel University won its first softball regular-season championship, and Gustavus Adolphus College won its first MIAC Playoff title. Now, as the 2016 season begins, that newfound parity appears to be here to stay with numerous teams aspiring to win the MIAC title or earn a Playoff bid this spring.



The MIAC titles won by the Royals and Gusties ended a pair of impressive streaks by the University of St. Thomas, as Bethel interrupted UST's streak of five regular-season titles in a row, and Gustavus became the only team not named St. Thomas to win the MIAC Playoffs in the 12-year history of the tournament.

In 2016, Bethel and Gustavus enter with strong returning rosters and high hopes to add more hardware to their collection. However, St. Thomas also has a strong nucleus back and an eye on returning to the top of the conference. Hamline also has a veteran-laden team that just missed out on the MIAC title a year ago, and the Pipers are hungry for another shot at the title.

The Royals went 18-4 (28-15) in conference play a year ago to win the league title by a single game over Hamline (27-13, 17-5 MIAC) in a race for the title that came down to the final doubleheader. The Gusties (34-16, 16-6 MIAC) and Tommies (35-12, 16-6 MIAC) each won at least 34 games, reached the NCAA Tournament, and shared third place to round out the formidable four-team Playoff field.

St. Catherine showed marked improvement in 2015, as the Wildcats were just a game behind Gustavus and UST in fifth with a 15-7 conference record (28-10 overall). saint Benedict (22-18, 11-11 MIAC) and Saint Mary's (18-20, 11-11 MIAC) both went .500 in the conference and shared sixth place. St. Olaf (15-25, 10-12 MIAC) was seventh, Macalester (19-20, 7-15 MIAC) was eighth and Carleton (11-27, 4-18 MIAC), Concordia (13-24, 4-18 MIAC) and Augsburg (9-31, 3-19 MIAC) rounded out the 2015 standings.

Now, with the 2016 season set to begin, the conference appears headed for one of the most memorable seasons in history with so many teams hoping to contend for the championship and postseason bids. Can Bethel defend its first-ever MIAC title? Will Gustavus use last season's Playoff run as a springboard to further success in 2016? Will St. Thomas return to its perch atop the standings? Can Hamline or another contender ascend all the way to the top of the standings? It's sure to be an exciting spring as the MIAC's teams answer those big questions on the diamond.

THE POLLS ARE IN

Further evidence that the 2016 season could shape up with an unforgettable battle for the MIAC championship comes in the form of the 2016 MIAC Softball Preseason Coaches' Poll. Four different teams received at least two first-place votes, with all four receiving at least 91 points. The coaches expect it to be crowded at the top, which should result in an entertaining, drama-filled season.

St. Thomas received four first-place votes and 111 points to headline the preseason poll, but defending MIAC Playoff champ Gustavus was just one point behind with a score of 110, and three-first place votes. Defending regular-season champion Bethel is also expected to contend once again with 100 points and three first-place votes, and Hamline had two first-place votes and 91 points in first.

St. Catherine, Saint Benedict and Saint Mary's are also expected to contend for one of the spots in the four-team MIAC Playoffs. The Wildcats were fifth in the poll with 82 points, the Blazers were seven points back (75) in sixth and Saint Mary's had 64 points in seventh place. St. Olaf received 46 points to finish eighth in the poll, with Macalester (39) and Carleton (36) right behind the Oles, and Augsburg (20) nipped Concordia (18) by two points for 11th place to round out the preseason predictions.

PLAYERS TO WATCH

The Tommies were an NCAA tournament team a year ago after finished second in the MIAC Playoffs and fourth in the regular-season standings, and UST expects to be back in title contention in 2016 despite the graduation of three-time MIAC Pitcher-of-the-Year Kendra Bowe. Versatile pitcher/hitter Katie Jo Delisle returns as does shortstop Megan DuPuis after both earned All-Region honors in 2015. Catcher Micaela Trainor also returns behind the plate for Head Coach John Tschida's club.

Gustavus graduated some key players from its MIAC Playoff title team last season, including star pitcher Sarah Rozell, but Head Coach Jeff Annis' team has plenty of talent back with an eye on a return trip to the NCAA tournament. Pitcher Hannah Heacox returns after earning All-MIAC honors with a 1.64 ERA in 2015, and utility players Jena Willis and Jessica Williams are both back after batting better than .323 a season ago.

Bethel also has a significant hole to fill, as All-American shortstop Angie Jackson graduated after winning two MIAC Player-of-the-Year honors in her career. However, the Royals hope to repeat with lots of players back with championship experience. Pitcher Karli Persson and catcher Caroline Kivisto are both two-time All-MIAC selections back for their senior seasons, and infielder Kal Sorenson also returns for the defending champs.

Hamline finished in a tie for second a year ago, and hopes to take that elusive next step toward a MIAC title in 2016 behind a supremely talented lineup. Senior shortstop Jamie Rubbelke and junior 2B Mary-Clare Couillard form one of the best middle infield tandems in the conference after both earned All-MIAC honors in 2015, and senior Amanda Orrell is also back to patrol the Piper outfield.

St. Catherine's improvement was one of the top stories in the MIAC a year ago, as the team just missed out on a Playoff bid. The Wildcats' young nucleus is back with All-MIAC pitchers Krista Flugstad and Megan Lindenfelser leading the way, and senior infielder Robyn Rohr was also an All-Conference pick after scoring 43 runs in 2015. Saint Benedict also has intentions of reaching the postseason with a trio of sophomores leading the way in St. Joseph. All-MIAC Honorable Mention catcher Sara Wennerstrand, pitcher Kiela DeVlamenick and infielder Becky Gigstad are all back after breakout rookie seasons in 2015.

Saint Mary's has some big bats back in Winona as it also looks to get back into the postseason picture. Junior Ashley Betzold was an All-MIAC selection for her combined work on the mound and at first base, outfield Kathi Opsahl is back after hitting .355 and sophomore Stanzy Snyder joins Opsahl in the outfield after earning All-MIAC honors as a rookie. St. Olaf returns most of its key players, as Jessica Bentley led the MIAC with 10 home runs and earned All-MIAC honors in 2015. Infielder Stephanie Borndale was an All-MIAC Honorable Mention pick, and fellow inifielder Woo Bandel is also back.

Macalester will have to replace three-time All-MIAC picks Sasa Wilson and Miranda Stokes, but senior outfield Abby Cox, junior catcher Nikki Caicedo and sophomore outfielder Lisa Semro are all expected to increase their production and lead the Scots in 2016. Carleton returns nearly its entire lineup intact as the Knights enter the season with hopes to ascend in the standings. All-MIAC junior Cassie Clarke and her .364 batting average are back in the lineup, pitcher Keelin Davis is back on the mound, and Katie Eppard returns to the outfield after batting .319 in her rookie season.

Augsburg has hopes to move up in 2016, bolstered by the return of All-MIAC Honorable Mention infielder Jenna Orth, senior catcher Sarah Buckner and utility player Lauren Hurley, who can play in the infield, outfield or behind the plate. Concordia showed improvement in 2015 and hopes to continue that trend in 2016. The Cobbers have All-Conference outfielder Madison Little back to lead the way, and junior Abigail Haraldson is Concordia's top returning pitcher.

CIRCLE THESE DATES

Though the remains of winter are still on the ground in Minnesota, the softball season officially begins Wednesday, with both Saint Mary's and Concordia opening their seasons on spring break trips to Clermont, Fla. Saturday, several MIAC teams throw out their first pitch with indoor games in Rochester, Minn., and the nonconference season will continue with dome contests and trips to warmer locations throughout February and most of March.

A big day on the 2016 calendar is Saturday, April 2, as that's when conference play beings. In 2016, the MIAC unveils a new schedule format, with some conference doubleheaders moved to Sundays in April to eliminate some of the mid-week missed class time. Each MIAC team will play 11 doubleheaders - one against each conference foe - with the MIAC regular-season set to conclude on Saturday, April 30.

The MIAC Playoffs will be held Friday, May 6, through Sunday, May 8, in the second year of the new high-seed host format. The tournament's No. 1 seed will earn the right to host the entire four-team, double elimination tournament, with two games May 6, three on May 7, and one or two championship games on May 8. If the No. 1 seed is unable to host, the right to host will be offered to No. 2, No. 3 and then No. 4. The winner of the MIAC's postseason tournament will receive an automatic bid to the 2016 NCAA Softball Tournament, which will begin the following weekend.

2016 MIAC Softball Playoffs

The 2016 MIAC Softball Playoffs will enter the second-season of the new format, with the No. 1 seed serving as host for the entire four-team, double-elimination tournament. If the No. 1 seed is unable to host, the right to host will be offered to No. 2, No. 3 and then No. 4. Also, the tournament has expanded from two to three days. This year's tournament will be held May 6-8. There will be two games on Friday, May 6, three on Saturday, May 7, and up to two title games on Sunday, May 8. The winner will receive the MIAC's automatic bid to the 2016 NCAA Division III Softball Tournament.
