2005 MIAC BASEBALL PREVIEW

It is safe to say that the 2005 season will be a competitive one for teams in the MIAC. With three teams entering conference play ranked very closely in the Midwest, the automatic bid into the NCAA Tournament could be anyone's. Teams have shown strong play in the preseason, whether their play will carry into the conference season will be the deciding factor in their ability to capture the MIAC title.

St. Thomas's win in the conference tournament last season marked the first time the MIAC Tournament champ was also the MIAC regular season champion. The Tommie's conference championship marked their fourth in five years, making them a strong favorite to contend for the title again. The Tommie's quest won't come without a fight. Concordia, Gustavus and St. Olaf made the MIAC Tournament last season with Bethel and Saint John's not far behind. These teams will be battling hard to earn their way into the top four spots in the conference. Augsburg, Macalester, and Saint Mary's finished the season in a three-way tie for eight place last year and are returning strong veterans who could help each team to a better finish this season. Carleton will look to veteran players and newcomers to make their run towards postseason play.

Augsburg: Head coach Keith Bateman hopes to take a page from his 2000 season when he was an assistant coach at Bethel. That year Bethel turned around a 7-13 conference finish the previous year by finishing 2000 14-6 in the conference; good enough for third place and a playoff berth. Bateman's hopes are that his young Augsburg team will compete hard for the school's first playoff run in school history. The Auggies hope seniors Jeremy Nelson (P) and Taylor Pagel (1B) will play to a similar level of last year and help lead the team into the postseason tournament.

Bethel: Head coach Greg Indlecoffer knows all to well that every game counts towards the playoffs. Last year's impressive 12-8 conference record was not good enough to make the MIAC tournament; Bethel missed the playoffs by just one game last season. Indlecoffer feels that the narrow miss has left his team even more motivated this season. He also is excited about the talent and attitudes his student-athletes will bring to the team. The return of seven starters from last season, along with a talented group of younger players should bring the team continued success.

Carleton: The Knights have a young and experienced team which Head Coach Bill Nelson hopes will help them contend for a top finish in the MIAC this season. Luke Muellerleile returns as their lone 2004 All-MIAC player and is coming off a strong season in which he batted .429 and reached base in all 29 games. Muellerleile also anchors the infield at shortstop while a number of players will compete to occupy the remaining positions. Brian Sharkey, the ace of the staff, and Matt Topeff return as the team's top two pitchers from a year ago. Coach Nelson and his Knights will need each player to contribute as they carry no seniors into the 2005 season.

Concordia: The Cobbers finished 2004 at 14-6 in the MIAC, only 3 games behind first-place St. Thomas. The team looks to repeat last season and make another playoff run by relying on potent offense and senior pitching. The Cobbers will return junior first baseman Ryan Hebrink, who started all 36 games and hit .328 with 11 home runs last season. Sophomore Chris Klabo also had a successful season by hitting .327 with 10 doubles and 22 RBI's. Look for senior pitcher Bryan Romsa to lead the Cobbers from the mound coming off of a 6-4 season. With student-athletes such as these, the Cobbers should have the makings of another strong playoff-bound season.

Gustavus: The Gusties will enter 2005 with a young team looking to repeat with another MIAC playoff run. After finishing the 2004 season at 13-7 in conference play, head coach Mike Carroll will need his offensive stars from a season ago to play at a similar level. Carroll should be pleased that outfielder Tony Kocinek is only a sophomore, after a year in which he hit .433 and led the MIAC with 54 RBI's. Senior outfielder Ash Larsen will give the Gusties veteran leadership along with strong offense. Larsen hit .360 with 4 home runs in 2004. Junior Ben Sherer ended last season with a .409 average and .679 slugging percentage. The Gusties' offensive firepower will be strong asset in their 2005 conference season.

Hamline: The Pipers hope their pitching experience will be the key to improving from last season and making the playoffs this season. Returning to the team are their top four pitchers from 2004 led by Aron Helm and Kyle Foster. In 2004 the two combined for an 8-9 record and 78 strikeouts. With Helm's senior leadership and sophomore Kyle Foster coming off his first year as a starting pitcher, head coach Jason Verdugo and his Pipers will be looking to them for strong performances again in 2005.

Macalester: Macalester will be returning most of its starters from a team that finished in a tie for 8th place in 2004. While the loss of Joel Brettingen will sting, the return of key pitching and defense should help the Scots continue to improve. Cormac Seely, Liam Bowen and Ted Kimble pitched the bulk of last season's innings and will bring their invaluable experience this season as well. Marc Rodwogin, a senior catcher, is coming off of a strong offensive season and will lead the team with his defense, as well as his offense.

Saint John's: The Johnnies finished last season in sixth place, a mere two games from a playoff berth. With the loss of some talented starters who were all either All-MIAC or All-Midwest Region team selections, other players will need to step up their performances. Look for sophomore Casey Haugen to have another strong year behind the plate as he was second in batting average on the team last season with a .404 average. Head coach Jerry Haugen will begin his 28th campaign as head coach and comes into the season as one of the top 25 active winning coaches in Division III. In Coach Haugen's last 17 years, he has led the Johnnies to 14 winning seasons. A feat he hopes to continue in 2005, along with a playoff run.

Saint Mary's: Ninth-year head coach Nick Whaley sees 2005 as a brand new year, after a disappointing 2004 season in which the Cardinals went 10-22 overall. The 2005 season won't be without challenges as the team has lost six seniors to graduation, although the return of some solid veterans will help alleviate any concern. Senior outfielders Matt Rink and Ryan Majerus are coming off solid seasons and should provide the leadership Whaley needs.

St. Olaf: The Oles' will be looking to continue their streak of competing in the conference tournament for six straight years. They have also set the bar high by never finishing lower than third place in MIAC play and winning 3 three regular season championships in the last eight years. Head coach Matt McDonald should feel confident about their chances this year with the returns of Eric Tobias and Will Huepenbecker.

Tobias brings ALL-MIAC credentials along with a 6-2 record and 2.57 ERA while Huepenbecker returns after elbow surgery. Brett Thoreson and Brett Berry meanwhile, will be looked towards to carry the offensive load.

St. Thomas: The Tommies have set their standards high after finishing the 2004 season at 17-3 in the MIAC and 38-3 overall. One of the student-athletes the Tommies will be banking on for leadership will be senior outfielder and Division III second team All-American Brett Olson. Olson led the MIAC in 2004 with a .477 batting average and a .519 on-base percentage. Senior leadership will also come from a familiar right arm in pitcher Brian Krause. Krause returns from a season in which he led the MIAC with 9 wins, 5 saves, and was second in the conference with 72 innings pitched. Head coach Dennis Denning and his team did lose six seniors from a year ago, but will bring back a strong group of student-athletes with varsity experience that will help play at a level they are accustomed to.

The 2005 MIAC Tournament will take place on May 14-15, 2005 in Northfield and Dundas, Minnesota. The top four teams at the end of the conference regular season qualify for the Tournament. The winner of the tournament receives the MIAC's automatic bid to the 2005 NCAA Tournament.

Bowen had a breakout year, established himself as a go-to-guy and led the team in several categories, including complete games (4), innings pitched (58), wins (3) and strikeouts (49). Kimble, overcoming a pre-season ankle injury, led the staff with a .226 opponent batting average and ranked second in strikeouts (36).
	Macalester's infield is led by Andrew Percival, Chris Papalia and Adam Wedwick. These three keyed a defensive one-eighty that included 31 double plays on the season. Percival, who will see action at all four infield positions and in the outfield, posted a career-high batting average of .311. Captain Marc Rodwogin, who is coming off career highs in batting average (.280) and RBI (16) will anchor the team behind the plate with his strong defensive skills and leadership.

Season Preview:	The St. Olaf baseball team looks to continue their success and return to the conference tournament for the sixth straight year and improve on their third place tie in 2004. In the last eight seasons, St. Olaf has won three regular-season and one postseason MIAC title and finished no worse than third, compiling a 137-48 record in league play (.741). Lefthander Eric Tobias is back after an All-MIAC campaign last spring. Tobias was 6-2 with a 2.57 ERA and 59 strikeouts in 56 innings. The Oles also welcome the return of Will Huepenbecker. Season Preview:

Coach Dennis Denning¹s 2005 team comes into April 7-7 overall, including a 9-1 loss to Division I Minnesota; a 3-2 defeat to No. 3-ranked UW-Whitewater (now 14-0); a loss to No. 4 Wooster (Ohio); and a split with St. Scholastica, a 42-win team in 2004. UST has a young pitching staff, and its .295 batting average is its lowest in several seasons, so it will lean on defense and timely hitting.

The Tommies return seven position players but must replace four starting pitchers from a team that finished 38-8 and reached the NCAA region finals. The 2004 Toms won 17 of their last 19 conference games then won three close MIAC playoff games to claim the postseason crown. The Toms were ranked 11th nationally in the final 2004 poll. They batted .362 and ranked in the top five nationally.

Under Coach Dennis Denning, the Tommies have reached 30-plus wins in seven of the last eight seasons. They are 167-33 in the last 10 conference regular-seasons. In MIAC tournament play, they are 13-4 and have won four of five championships. Denning's 10-year postseason record is 44-22 (42-16 since 1999).

Senior Brian Krause broke a St. Thomas record with 24 appearances last season and now has pitched in 71 games over three-plus seasons. Krause is on pace to finish in the top three in NCAA Division III history in career appearances. (UST career-record holder Mike Honsa ranks 11th on the Division III charts with 76 appearances).

Senior All-American CF Brett Olson holds the UST career record for steals and triples. He reached base or had an RBI hit in his last 30 games of 2004. He ranked second in Division III in triples (eight), ninth in hits (71) and 17th in batting average (.447).
