

Championship Mac Team Places 5 Men on All-Conference Eleven

Minnesota College Coaches Combine to Select
First, Second All-State Aggregation.

Coaches of the Minnesota College conference football teams, in response to the request of The Associated Press, have selected the foregoing first and second all-conference teams for 1925.

Rated on Point System.

Five members of the champion Macalester team, two men each from Hamline and Concordia, one from St. Olaf and one from St. John's are the coaches' selection for the mythical first team.

On the second team three Macalester men are given places, and three from Gustavus, two each from St. John's and St. Olaf and one from Hamline complete the roster.

Each coach presented his choice of men for first and second teams, 5 points being accorded a man for first team selection and 3 points for second. Players holding the greatest number of points for the respective position won the places.

Only one man was the unanimous selection of the coaches for a first team berth and that was Malcolm Smiley of Macalester college, who was accorded the quarterback position and captaincy of the mythical team.

Four of the six coaches selected three other players for the first team. They are Ray Cochrane of Macalester, halfback; "Sally" Brewster of Concordia, halfback, and Marvin Pedlar of Hamline, tackle.

Karl Lawrence of Concordia won an end berth with three firsts, one second and one third, and was followed by Louis Swearingen of Hamline, who was awarded the other wing position with two firsts and a second. In the opinion of the coaches, Lawrence was one of the best defense ends in the circuit and was up among the top-notchers in receiving passes.

Smiley Honored.

Charles Stark of Macalester was right behind Swearingen with two firsts, which won for him an end position on the second team. Eli Enger of St. Olaf, although out of the games with injuries for a large part of the season, was given the other end position on the second team. He also received one second choice vote for a halfback berth.

It was the expression of the coaches that Martin Pedlar of Hamline and Woods of Macalester stood head and shoulders above other tackles of the conference. Pedlar played a good game for the Pipers all through the season, breaking through opponents' lines and spilling the ball carriers for losses in every game.

The Macalester man came into his own in the middle of the season, after a slow start. In the Macalester-Carlton game, Woods was one of the outstanding stars and from then on played an excellent game. Captain Clark of Gustavus, however, gave Woods a close run for the first team tackle position, getting three firsts as compared to three firsts, a second and a third for the Macalester star.

Selection of Capt. Henry Pearson of St. Olaf and Ernest Wilcox of Macalester for the guard positions appeared certain from the start, the Ole flash standing out on top with three firsts and followed by Wilcox, who received two firsts and a second. Wilcox played by the side of Woods on the championship Macalester team and proved a stubborn defense for opponents.

Center Berth Close.

Durenberger of St. John's and George Olds of Macalester ran a nip-and-tuck race for the center berth and it was not until all of the coaches had cast their vote that Durenberger was assured a place on the first team. The St. John's pivot man received three firsts and Olds was accorded two firsts and a third. Captain Smiley, in receiving the

unanimous vote for quarterback, was declared to be a brilliant open field runner with a classy change of pace, and also an exceptional passer. He also is a wonderful punter. He combines these attributes with his ability to run a team under any conditions, and in him the Minnesota conference saw one of its best players in years.

The two halfbacks were easily the best in the conference. Ray Cochrane of Macalester, was rated next to Smiley in ball carrying and "Sally" Brewster of Concordia, rated as one of the fleetest men in the circuit, played a sterling game all season. His speed is one of his greatest threats and many times during the season he used it in getting in front of opponents' passes.

Harold Harm is the third Macalester man to win a place on the first team backfield, but he was given a close race by Milo Mielke of St. Olaf, fullback on the second team. Harm was given two firsts and three seconds, while Mielke took three firsts.

Honorable Mention.

Coaches who selected the teams were Frank Mayer of Macalester, Eldre B. Anderson of St. Olaf, Bill Houle of St. John's, D. C. Mitchell of Gustavus Adolphus, Harry Carlson of Hamline, and Fenwick Watkins of Concordia.

Honorable mention was given to the following players, all of whom received votes:

Quarterbacks—McMann of Hamline, and Harmon of Gustavus.

Halfbacks—McCoy of Hamline, Hollander of Gustavus, Swanson of Gustavus and Schumacker of St. Johns.

Fullbacks—Schumacker of St. Johns and Endres, St. Johns.

Ends—Schoenecker of St. Johns, Rawlings of Hamline, Hall of St. Johns, Corrin of Macalester, Oestreich of Gustavus, and Skalbeck of Gustavus.

Tackles—Bongsto of St. Olaf, Boe of Concordia, Osendorf of St. Johns, Lium of St. Olaf, and Spaulding of Macalester.

Guards—Robertson of Macalester, Jacobs of Macalester, Misho of St. Johns, Froembgen of St. Johns, and Jacobson of St. Olaf.
