Cobs, Gusties Top Players' ll-MIAC, Jays Place Kos

Collegeville-Champion Concordia and co-runnerup Gustavus dominate the annual players' all-MIAC football team compiled here Thursday.

The league-leading Cobbers and Gustavus each placed five men on a 12-man first team compiled from the all-opponents teams submitted by each team in the conference. Fourth place St. John's and the other co-runnerup team, Macalester, each placed a man on the first unit to round out the squad.

Macalester, with five men, dominates the second team and is followed by St. John's and Duluth with three men each on the second

squad. St. Thomas and Concordia placed one man apiece on the second team.

There were no unanimous choices for first string berths this year, the first time that this has happened in the five-year history of the players' all-conference team. Quarterback Roger Gilbertson and fullback Curt Gabrielson both of Concordia were the closest things to unanimous choices this year with 13 of a possible 14 votes each.

Tackle Al Tweit of Concordia is the omy repeater from last year's team. Jerry Boldt of Macalester and Gabrielson moved from second string berths in 1956 to first string positions in 1957.

Gustavus dominates the line picked theoretically the potent possible in the MIAC with an end, a tackle and both guards and the center. Concordia's high scoring aggregation has three men in the backfield and two in the

Due to the close balloting for the end positions, which saw Len Kos of St. John's and Jack Westin of Gustavus tied for the second spot with eight votes apiece, three ends have been named. On the second unit close balloting necessitated two quarterbacks, and three guards.

The first team is the youngest picked since the start of the players' all-MIAC, with six jurors, a sophomore and five seniors named.

Injuries during the season no doubt kept several backfield standouts from more prominent mention in the balloting. Last year's second string quarterback, Bob Berquist of Macalester, and Dick Robinson of Augsburg, also on the number two squad last year, were most conspicuously ab-

Concordia was named the most sportsmanlike team in the MIAC for the fourth consecutive year.
