Gustavus and St. Thomas placing one each. Only last place Macalester, which dropped eight straight after an opening game victory, failed to land a player on either unit.

In addition to McDowell, Roering and Beckman on the offensive unit, the other St. John's players were guard Tom Honer, halfback Bob Spinner and fullback Rich Froehle. Spinner, two-time MIAC scoring champion, missed a unanimous selection by one vote.

Completing the offensive backfield at quarterback is St. Thomas junior Bruce Reinhart, who led the conference in passing and total offense, piling up more than 1,000 yards on offense.

The offensive line, anchored by McDowell and 245-pound Gary Larson of Concordia at the tackles, averages 219.2, while the offensive backfield hits 182.2. The defensive five-man line, again anchored by McDowell, averages 225.

Smallest player on either platoon, and one of the smallest ever to win MIAC all-conference honors, is Tony Pazik, St. Thomas co-captain and linebacker. He weighs 155. The offensive unit has two juniors — Froehle and Reinhart — and one sophomore, Ken Casperson of Augsburg at center. The defensive unit has two juniors and two sophomores.

Craig Muires of the Johnnies was placed at defensive safety for the second straight year, while sharing a halfback berth with Beckman is MIAC sprint champion Dick LeBeau of UMD. Gustavus halfback Jim Harder missed a berth on either team due to injuries which kept him from two games.

Place 11 On Squad

The unconquerable Johnnies—for the past two years at least—of St. John's university at Collegeville dominate the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic conference 1963 all-conference team named today by the Pioneer Press with the aid of the loop coaches.

Three of the Jays were named to both the offensive and defensive teams, and St. John's placed a total of 11, or half, of the 22 men selected for this year's honor teams.

Heading the St. John's contingent was John McDowell, 260-pound tackle and one of the MIAC's leading contenders for Little All-America honors. The former St. Thomas academy three-sport star was a unanimous selection for both offensive and defensive tackle, the only player accorded unanimous honors.

The other two Jays selected for both offensive and defensive platoons were Ken Roering, senior end from St. Cloud who was honored for a third successive year, and Bernie Beckman, senior halfback from Elbow Lake. Beckman just last Monday was named the most valuable player in the MIAC for the 1963 season. St. John's landed six players on the offensive unit and five on the defensive platoon. Augsburg, a surprise third place finisher, placed two men on the offensive platoon while runnerup Concordia, St. Thomas and Gustavus Adolphus each had one each.

In addition to the five Johnnies on the defensive platoon, Minnesota Duluth placed two with Concordia, Hamline

All But Six Are Seniors

Coach Jake Christiansen of Concordia was somewhat of a prophet when he said after losing to St. John's, "I don't know if I could beat this team if I had my pick of all the players in the conference."

The other league coaches, apparently, feel somewhat the same way.

The Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference coaches were polled for the Minneapolis Tribune All-Conference team, and St. John's filled 12 of the 22 positions on the offensive-defensive squad.

FOUR JOHNNIES — Craig Muires, Bernie Beckman, Ken Roering and John McDowell — were selected on both offense and defense. Muires was selected at quarterback and defensive safety. Beckman at halfback, Roering at end and McDowell at tackle.

Muires thus winds up directing an attack he masterminded all season. Beckman and Bob Spinner at halfbacks and Rich Froehle at fullback. It's an all-St. John's offensive backfield — but just barely. Muires won by just one vote over St. Thomas quarterback Bruce Reinhart, the best passer in the conference.

Other members of the championship St. John's squad honored were offensive guard Dave Honer and defensive end Hardy Reyerson.

Gary Larsen of Concordia made it both ways at tackle, helping anchor a defensive line that averages 227
