

2001 MIAC FOOTBALL PREVIEW

Much anticipation surrounds the 2001 MIAC football season, and several changes are evident as one looks forward to the 2001 campaign. Three new head coaches (Carleton, Concordia, Hamline) join a tough conference that sent two teams to the NCAA Tournament a year ago. Additionally, the Metrodome Showcase, which has been a mainstay in the MIAC schedule for the past several seasons, will not take place in 2001. Regardless of these differences, there is no doubt that MIAC football will continue to be some of the top Division III football in the nation.

The preseason MIAC Football Coaches Poll shows that competition will be very tight this fall. Four different teams received first place votes in what looks like an impossible season in which to predict a winner. The overwhelming picks to finish in the top five in conference play include defending MIAC champion Bethel, NCAA runner-up Saint John's, St. Thomas, Gustavus, and St. Olaf. Saint John's and Bethel each received more than two first place votes. Bethel and Saint John's also appear in preseason national rankings. D3football.com ranks Bethel fifth and Saint John's tenth nationally in its preseason ranking. Sports Illustrated lists Saint John's seventh in its preseason ranking.

New this year will be the "MIAC Game of the Week." The MIAC has teamed up with Minnesota Sports Update to provide exciting MIAC coverage each week, to be broadcast live over the internet. MIAC football fans can access each week's featured game through www.minnesotasportsupdate.com. The first broadcast will be September 15 as Bethel hosts Macalester at 1:00pm. "The MIAC has a wide audience, including fans, alumni, and family across the nation. We are very pleased to be able to bring the excitement of MIAC football action into their homes each week," stated MIAC Assistant to the Executive Director Dan McKane.

Looking back, the 2000 MIAC season featured very strong competition in each week of play. There were as many as four teams ranked in national polls each week. Bethel went undefeated in MIAC play (9-0), en route to winning the MIAC Championship for the first time since the school joined the conference in 1977. The Royals' season was highlighted by a 43-36 victory over 1999 MIAC champion Saint John's. By winning the conference crown, Bethel earned the MIAC's automatic bid to the NCAA Playoffs. Saint John's was awarded one of four at-large bids to the national tournament. The Johnnies displayed tremendous endurance as they won their way to the NCAA Championship game, playing all five of their playoff games on the road. Saint John's took on perennial power Mount Union in Salem, Va., in the national championship game. Mount Union tallied a 10-7 score to win the game and end Saint John's six-game winning streak.

Season Preview:	In 1996, Augsburg College finished the football season 3-7, after three straight .500-or-above campaigns. The Auggies graduated seven starters and had several question marks facing the club entering the 1997 season. All the Auggies did in 1997 was win the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championship, beat MIAC powerhouse St. John's in the team's home-opener, and make it to the NCAA Division III national playoffs for the first time in school history. In 2000, Augsburg finished 3-7, after three straight .500-or-above campaigns. The Auggies graduated 11 starters and had several question marks facing the club entering the 2001 season. And the Auggies' 2001 home-opener is against defending national runner-up St. John's. Déjà vu all over again in 2001? Possibly, said head coach Jack Osberg, entering his 11th year as Augsburg's head coach with the third-longest tenure of any coach in the MIAC. Osberg has a 49-52 career record, and his victory total puts him just nine wins behind Edor Nelson's 58 wins (1947-69) for the most in school history. Season Preview:	Bethel College is coming off their best season in school history as they went 10-0 in the regular season and won their first-ever Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) championship. After winning the conference, the Royals proceeded to host Pacific Lutheran University in Bethel's first-ever NCAA playoff game. Despite a disappointing 41-13 loss to the defending national champions, the Royals had a great 2000 season and as they look to 2001, again have reason to have high expectations as they return 17 starters, 10 of which were named to the All-MIAC first or second teams. Head Coach Steve Johnson was named MIAC coach of the year for the third time and has put together a 77-42-1 career record. Offensively, junior All-MIAC quarterback Scott Kirchoff will look to improve upon his sophomore season when he threw for 2,642 yards and 23 touchdowns. Kirchoff's completion percentage of 62.4% set a school record and his 212 completions tied a school record. Junior fullback Mike Johnson, an All-West region selection as a sophomore, rushed for 638 yards and four touchdowns and caught 42 passes for 560 yards and three touchdowns. Johnson will look to carry the load in the rushing attack in 2001. Senior receiver Jordy Hage was an All-MIAC second-team member after catching 34 passes for 369 yards and five touchdowns last season. Bethel returns all five starters on the offensive line and will look to be a dominant force in the MIAC. Defensively, the Royals lost All-American and NCAA record holder Ben Matthews. He tied NCAA all-division records for interceptions in a game (5) and interceptions in a season (15). Bethel led NCAA Division III in turnover ratio last season and hopes to carry the same aggressive style into the 2001 season under new defensive coordinator Jimmy Miller. Miller took over for Mike Plinske who retired following the season. The Royals welcome back 8 starters on defense, led by junior All-MIAC free safety Hans Bengtson. Bengtson led the Royals with 93 total tackles last season and also was second on the team with five interceptions. A linebacking corps of seniors Ben Kidd (69 tackles), Randy Larson (64 tackles), and Jason Holm (51 tackles, missed three games with a knee injury) all return. On the defensive front, senior end Rick Meyer (8.5 sacks) and junior end Jon Foss (7.0 sacks) combined for 24.5 tackles for loss and will anchor the defensive line. In the defensive backfield, with the loss of Matthews and fellow cornerback Kris Collins, senior Nate Klint will move from strong safety to corner as the Royals look to get their top players on the field. With the departure of Matthews' and Collins Bethel is going to be looking to fill the void at one cornerback position. Season Preview:	A new coach, a new look and new schemes signal that Carleton football is undergoing a transformation in 2001. At the forefront of this redesign is new head coach Chris Brann. Defensive coordinator at the University of Chicago for the past three years, Brann replaces Bob Sullivan, who retired after 22 seasons as the Knights' head man. Brann helped lead the Maroons to conference titles in 1998 and 2000, and led a defense rated second in the nation in 2000. Couple a small recruiting class of only 12 newcomers with 36 returning letterwinners, and Brann expects his roster to barely reach 50 players. Season Preview:	The Hamline mens football team was this close to a very successful season last year. A nice record and middle-of-the-conference finish were there for the taking, but it slipped through their hands in a whirlwind of poor execution and mental errors in the final minutes of close games. That will not happen this year. Not if Larson can do anything about it. He said three or four well-executed plays would have made the difference in a number of those games last year. And he has set to work building a more disciplined, cool, calm and collected team. "They have worked really hard," Larson said. "They are a very disciplined bunch. They are always on time. I think that translates into discipline on the field." A 55-0 whipping of a club team on a spring trip to Spain proved that the Pipers are a good football team. Whether that win will catapult them to MIAC success remains to be seen. They return a very strong running game, one they will use extensively, and all-conference wide receiver Amsden. The team's offensive leadership will need to come from one of these positions, because the team will be young at quarterback. The defense will need to be very solid, to compliment the ball control offense. Now after forty practices and months of waiting, they appear ready to take back a few of the games that slipped away last season. Larson said he is looking forward to seeing where his team stands when the "bullets start flying" in their first game, at UW-Green Bay. "I want us to play as good as we are capable of without making mistakes," Larson said. "I want us to play hard and be physical. We have been very pleased with the attitudes and work ethic of the kids. I think they are hungry and ready to taste success."

Season Preview:	Fourth-year coach Dennis Czech and the Scots are optimistic about moving up in the MIAC after a disappointing 1-9 campaign a year ago. The Scots had success throwing the football in 2000 and look be steady on the offensive side of the ball again despite having to replace All-MIAC quarterback Aaron Quitmeyer, who passed for 5,716 yards in his Macalester career. Standout receiver Ty O'Connell (Sr., Helena, MT / Capital) returns after catching 53 passes for 768 yards and seven touchdowns last season, as does four-year starting running back Grant Heuett (Sr., Pueblo, CO / South), who rushed for 600 yards at 3.9 a clip while catching 20 passes out of the backfield. Clark Wohlfert (Jr., Sun Prairie, WI), Dan Frey (Sr., Northfield, MN) and Eric Chapin (Jr., Cedar Rapids, IA / Washington) are back to lead an experienced offensive line. Andrew Porter (Jr., Rogers, MN / Elk River) is one of the MIAC's top defensive lineman and returns after registering 85 tackles (22 for loss of yardage) and 13 sacks. The all-conference selection was named to pre-season All-America teams by D3football.com and Football Gazette. Linebacker Nick Fruge (Sr., Coon Rapids, MN / Blaine) was in on 66 tackles and five QB sacks and is a four-year starter for the Scots. Season Preview:	The Saint John's University football team will enter the 2001 season with much excitement after advancing to last year's national championship game. The Johnnies are expected to return five starters – three on offense and two on defense – from a team that won a school record 13 games. SJU went 13-2 overall and 8-1 in the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference in 2000. For the 49th consecutive season John Gagliardi will be on the sidelines coaching SJU. Gagliardi is beginning his 53rd season as a collegiate head coach. The winningest active coach and second all-time in college football history, Gagliardi currently owns a 377-109-11 collegiate career record. Gagliardi is currently 31 wins away from Eddie Robinson's all-time collegiate victory record of 408 wins. Season Preview:	St. Olaf enters the 2001 football season fueled with optimism generated from the first winning season (7-3) since 1990. A number of outstanding returnees dot the roster as both sides of the ball possess a minimum of eight returning starters. Sean Koomen ('04, Mankato, Minn.), was effective as the extra point/field goal kicker last fall and will return for the 2001 season. On the offensive side there appears to be plenty of potential firepower as the Oles return nine starters. Wideout Steve Ryan ('02, So. St. Paul, Minn.), leads a truly outstanding group of wide receivers including Jake Rath ('02, Apple Valley, Minn.), Zack Kent ('02, Colorado Springs, Colo.), and Neal Olson ('03, Wisconsin Rapids, Wis.). The Oles hope to be bolstered by the return of Brian Sprout ('02, Lake City, Minn.) who had spectacular two seasons before being sidelined by injury last fall. Marc Davies ('02, Richfield, Minn.) is an exceptional tight end. The quarterback position is solid with two proven winners in Joe Hammond ('02 Neillsville, Wis.), and Brian Senske ('04 Apple Valley, Minn.). The offensive line features Jeff Flugum('02,Burnsville, Minn.) who has started 30 consecutive games. Rob Ward ('02, Rochester, Minn.) and Jake Landsteiner ('02, New Ulm, Minn.) also return as offensive line starters. In addition, Tilman Achberger ('04, Northfield, Minn.) who is moving from his reserve tight end role to offensive tackle, is expected to make a sizable contribution. Tailback, Manuel Spreigl ('02, So. St. Paul, Minn) rushed for 1290 yards in 2000 to become the first Ole to reach the 1000-yard plateau since 1990. He is complimented by several other talented performers including two HM All-Conf. players at the fullback position, Cordell Hunkins ('03, Apple Valley, Minn.), and Kevin Clausen ('02, Pierson, Ia.). Tim Baer ('03, Ettrick Wis.) and Jay Larsen ('02, Northfield, Minn.) provide the Oles with two additional quality tailbacks who are expected to contribute yards to the Ole rushing attack. The Ole defense is led by linebacker, Matt Lafferty ('03, Apple Valley, Minn.), Dan Meyers ('03, Cannon Falls, Minn.), linebacker and defensive end, and James Struble ('02, Sparta, Wis.). The defensive secondary features two veterans, Cory Dingels ('02, Gibbon, Minn.), and Shane Vatland ('02, Morristown, Minn.), who enter their fourth year as starters.

Season Preview:	There are reasons for optimism for the 2001 St. Thomas football team -- notably 20 of 24 returning starters back, led by two All-America candidates. There also are reasons for concern -- another grueling September schedule and several off-season injuries that have eroded depth. The 2000 Tommies made a lot of big plays, but their inexperience caused them to miss some chances in a 6-4 finish. Although the Tommies secured the school's sixth consecutive winning season and tied for third in the MIAC at 6-3, they know they can and must play sharper in 2001 in order to challenge for an MIAC championship. The Toms open at home Sept. 8 vs. Division II Bemidji State, a team that also returns 20 starters and gets a one-week jump with a Sept. 1 game. St. Thomas then begins MIAC play with two games against teams with new head coaches -- Sept. 15 at Concordia-Moorhead and Sept. 22 at home vs. Carleton. The Tommies close the month with a Sept. 29 trip to rival St. John's, the 2000 NCAA Division III runner-up. On offense, the Toms have an All-American candidate at running back in junior Jake Barkley; return three proven wide receivers; return five of their six starters up front from tight end to tackle; and welcome back junior quarterback Nick Ambrasas, who won the starting job at mid-season and showed steady improvement. Roney said his offensive line had an excellent offseason and will report to camp in terrific shape. Juniors Joe Moline and Logan Kane return at the right tackle and guard spots; soph Blake Norman is back at left tackle; junior Justin Wallick played guard last year. On defense, senior lineman Andy Kaiser (career: 187 tackles, 14.5 sacks), an All-American candidate, leads the charge. Four other senior starters are back -- tackle Aaron Johnson, end Conor Casey, linebacker Bob Hannah and cornerback Connell Nolan. Junior starters back are linebackers Rick Joslin (90 tackles, two sacks) and Sean O'Leary (71 tackles, four sacks), and free safety Joe Fritze (51 tackles, 3 INT, 10 break-ups).
