# 2016-17 MIAC Men's Basketball Season Preview

BLOOMINGTON, Minn. – The 2015-16 Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) men's basketball season ended in unforgettable fashion, with confetti falling from the ceiling as the University of St. Thomas hoisted the NCAA Division III Men's Basketball National Championship trophy. Now, with the 2016-17 season about to tip off, that excitement is bubbling up again as the league's teams set out to once again prove the MIAC's standing as one of the best conferences in the nation.

Once the confetti was done falling, St. Thomas had a 30-3 overall record and a six-game winning streak through an unbelievably difficult national tournament field. Head Coach John Tauer and his team also posted an 18-2 record in conference play to win their 11th-straight MIAC championship. UST graduated a lot of key players, but always seem to reload, and this time around they'll be seeking their 12th-straight MIAC crown, a repeat national title, and a third Division III championship in seven seasons.

Perhaps one of the most impressive facts about the MIAC's strength and depth in 2015-16 is that the

national champions didn't even win their own conference tournament. St. Olaf (19-10, 14-6 MIAC) won its second MIAC Playoff title in three seasons with a win over the Tommies, and Head Coach Dan Kosmoski's club was just a few points away from a second-straight Sweet 16 appearance after reaching the second round of the NCAA tourney.

Concordia (16-10, 13-7 MIAC) and Saint John's (19-8, 13-7 MIAC) shared third place a year ago with Bethel (18-9, 12-8 MIAC) just a game behind that duo in fifth. Augsburg (15-11) and Carleton (13-12) shared sixth place at 10-10 with the Auggies earning the sixth and final MIAC Playoff bid on tiebreaker criteria, and Gustavus (12-13, 9-11 MIAC) was also in the Playoff hunt until the very end. Saint Mary's (9-16, 7-13 MIAC), Hamline (4-21, 2-18 MIAC) and Macalester (4-21, 2-18 MIAC) rounded out the final spots of the 2015-16 standings.

In addition to the Tommies' run to the title and St. Olaf's postseason success, the MIAC proved to be an elite league a year ago with more than half (six) of its teams winning at least 15 games and 7-of-11 teams finishing above .500, with an eighth just a game below even. With the top two teams graduating a lot of key players and returning and incoming talent back throughout the conference, the 2016-17 season could be as deep and as balanced a season as the MIAC has seen in some time, and it's going to be quite a battle for the conference championship, six Playoff spots, and postseason tournament title.

# **COACHES CAST THEIR VOTES**

Even though the Tommies said goodbye to many of the key contributors from the national title team, the MIAC coaches still the conference is theirs to win for a 12<sup>th</sup>-straight season. UST received seven first-place votes and 95 total points to finish atop the 2016-17 MIAC Men's Basketball Preseason Coaches' Poll by a single point. Tauer is certainly glad to have star guard Grant Shaeffer and starting forward Ryan Boll back in the lineup, and senior center Jordan Burich figures to have an expanded role, but the Tommies will need to replace five seniors on their quest to repeat.

Bethel is expected to be St. Thomas' top challenger for the title, and could be the team to finally end UST's run in the MIAC, as the Royals received four first-place votes and 94 points to finish just a point behind the defending champs in the MIAC poll. Head Coach Doug Novak has a loaded, experienced team back in 2016-17 with two-time All-MIAC guards Bridgeport Tusler and Brycen Wojta running the show and All-Conference/All-Defensive Team guard Trevor Hall also back to give Bethel the deepest backcourt in the league.

Augsburg and Saint John's are also expected to be in the title hunt and Playoff field, as each received 74 points to share third place in the MIAC Preseason Coaches' Poll. All-MIAC star forward Collin Olmscheid is back for the Auggies to bolster their high hopes, along with talented guards Harry Sonie and Richie Perea. Saint John's graduated a pair of decorated guards, but the Johnnies hope to reload behind sophomore guard David Stokman, junior wing Patrick Strom and junior post Tyler Weiss.

The two Northfield schools also figure to be in the MIAC Playoff picture, as Carleton was picked to finish fifth with 59 points, and St. Olaf was just five points back with 54 in sixth place. The Knights have one of the MIAC's best players back in All-Region star forward Kevin Grow, and senior guards Mitchell Biewen and Peter Bakker-Arkema contribute to the team's high hopes. The Oles also graduated a ton of talent from its NCAA-Tournament team, but hope senior forwards Austin Majeskie and Robert Tobroxen can keep St. Olaf in MIAC



championship and NCAA title contention again in 2016-17.

Gustavus received 45 points to finish seventh in the poll, with Macalester in eighth with 39 points, as both also hope to contend for a trip to the MIAC Playoffs this season. The Gusties have Riley Sharbono and AJ Hatchett back on the wings, while Peter Kruize is back in the post in St. Peter. The Scots hope to have their best team in years with senior Kareem Ismail and Dylan Kilgour back to finish their decorated careers, and sophomore Michael Gutierrez hoping to take another step forward after a great rookie campaign.

Concordia (33 points), Saint Mary's (25 points) and Hamline (13) points rounded out the final three spots in the poll. The Cobbers hope to return to the MIAC Playoffs behind the senior trio of Dylan Alderman, Zach Kinny and Austin Nelson. Saint Mary's showed improvement in 2015-16 and hopes to keep moving up the standings behind its own senior leadership, including Wilie Ferron, Quashingm Smith-Pugh and Aaron Romportl. Hamline has Honorable Mention guard Zach Smith back to run the show, and sophomore forwards Connor Knutson and Isaac Brooks back to anchor things in the paint.

The 2016-17 season tips off Tuesday, Nov. 15 with eight of the league's 11 teams playing on opening night. Conference play starts Wednesday, Nov. 30, and will run through Saturday, Feb. 18, when the MIAC champion will be crowned and six Playoff bids will be finalized.

Speaking of the MIAC Playoffs, this marks the first year of a new rotation where men and women will alternate postseason schedules each year. The men have traditionally been on a Wednesday-Friday-Sunday schedule, but this year they'll flip to Tuesday-Thursday-Saturday, with Playoff games on Feb. 21, 23 and 25. Each game will tip off at 7 p.m., giving the title game a prime-time slot on Saturday night.

The NCAA Tournament will follow after that to conclude what promises to be another exciting year on the courts of the conference, and to see if St. Thomas can defend its national title or if another MIAC team can make a splash in the big dance.

# 2017 MIAC Men's Basketball Playoffs

The 2017 MIAC Playoffs will feature the top six teams in the conference standings playing in a high-seed-host, single-elimination postseason tournament. This year, the men's and women's Playoffs will flip days, with the men playing Tuesday-Thursday-Saturday, including a much-anticipated 7 p.m. for the Saturday night final.

The two top seeds will receive a bye to the semifinal round, while the No. 3 seed will host the No. 6 seed, and the No. 4 seed will host the No. 5 seeds during the quarterfinals, which will be held Tuesday, Feb. 21. The top remaining seed will play at the No. 2 seed and the lowest remaining seed will play at the No. 1 seed during the semifinals, which are scheduled for Thursday, Feb. 23. The championship game is set for Saturday, Feb. 25, at 7 p.m., with the two semifinal winners meeting on home court of the top remaining seed. The winner will receive

the MIAC's automatic bid to the 2016 NCAA Division III Men's Basketball Tournament.
