2004 MIAC MEN'S INDOOR TRACK & FIELD PREVIEW

The 2004 MIAC Men's Indoor Track & Field season will feature many talented individuals and teams looking to capture the conference title on March 5-6 in Collegeville, Minn. Perennial MIAC powerhouse St. Thomas will be challenged by strong teams from Gustavus, Carleton, Saint John's, Hamline, and St. Olaf. Looking to improve upon last year's performances and finish in the upper half of the MIAC standings are Augsburg, Bethel, Concordia, Macalester, and Saint Mary's. Individually, the MIAC will be lead by two returning All Americans; Augsburg's Mathew Shannon and Carleton's Matt Hooley.

St. Thomas will look to make it 20 for 20 in MIAC Indoor Track & Field Team Championships this year and set a new MIAC record for most consecutive conference titles won in any sport. The Tommies captured their 19th straight MIAC championship last year, winning by 47.5 points. Even though the Tommies lost five All-Americans from last years squad, many top performers will return to the roster.

Gustavus enters the 2004 season minus three graduated All-Americans from last year's second place team. The Gusties will rely on a strong group of athletes in field events and some very talented freshman to help contend for a title.

Carleton first-year Coach Dave Ricks inherits a team strong in the distance events and improving in the throwing events, but inexperienced in the jumps and sprints. The Knight's top returner is All-American Matt Hooley, who won the 1,500-meter title at last year's MIAC championship and earned All-America honors in the event as well.

Saint John's will try to improve on its fourth place finish at last year's MIAC indoor championships. SJU's top returning athletes are Michael Marschel, in the 800-meters; Paul Ferber, in the triple jump; Pat Hengel, in the pole vault and Lee Clintsman, in the 100-meters.

Hamline will look forward to the 2004 season after finishing fifth at the 2003 MIAC Indoor Championships. Fifth-year head coach Paul Schmaedeke will look to captains Will Sallee, David Brosnahan, and Wyatt Ammon to provide leadership in the upcoming season. Sallee is reigning conference champion in the 55-meter high hurdles.

St. Olaf will find it difficult to duplicate or improve on their third place MIAC finish in 2003. The Oles lost nine scorers from the 2003 squad. Returning St. Olaf scorers from 2003 include Jesse Horst 5th in the 800 meters, Sam Hauck 3rd in the 1000 meters, and Peder Arneson 6th in the 5000 meters, Peter Cathcart 2nd in the Shot Put.

Bethel Coach Mike Goldman is optimistic about his team's potential after last season's 8th place finish at the MIAC Championships. With just three graduates last year, 34 student-athletes return to give a solid foundation to score more than the 22 points that was earned last season.

Saint Mary's first year Coach Kirk Nauman is looking for improvement from his Cardinals ninth place finish last season. Seniors Todd Yankowski and Jim Baertsch will provide leadership for the Cardinals.

Macalester is looking to get a lot of points generated from the middle-and long-distance runners from last falls fourth-place MIAC cross country squad. The Scots have an increase in talent and depth from last year's 10th place squad.

Concordia is hoping that a pair of distance runners and several newcomers will carry the squad to a top ten finish at the conference championship meet.

The 2004 MIAC Indoor Track & Field Championships will be held at Saint John's University in Collegeville, Minn. on March 5-6, 2004.

Mathew Shannon (Sr., Minneapolis, Minn./Washburn HS) has established himself as one of the top sprinters in the MIAC and the nation over the last few years, and this year should be no exception.

A 12-time All-MIAC performer (seven first-team, five honorable-mention), two-time conference champion in the outdoor 400-meter dash and school record-holder in 11 different events, Shannon made Augsburg history last season when he became the first Auggie male track and field athlete to earn multiple All-American honors in the same year, finishing third nationally in the outdoor 400-meter dash (47.18 seconds) and fourth in the indoor 400-meter dash (48.59 seconds). He is the only Augsburg athlete ever to break the 48-second barrier in the outdoor 400 and the 49-second barrier in the indoor 400.

"Mathew has really made himself into one of the top 400 men in the country, and he's definitely a threat to win multiple events in the conference," Barker said.

Ten letterwinners return to the Auggie lineup, including several quality sprinters. Steven Floyd (Jr., Minneapolis, Minn./Park Center HS), Jason Edwards (Sr., Fergus Falls, Minn.) and Steve Zaffke (So., Stewartville, Minn.) joined Shannon on a 1,600-meter relay team that finished second in the indoor conference meet and third in the outdoor conference meet last year.

Floyd also earned individual honors with an All-MIAC honorable-mention finish in the outdoor 400-meter hurdles, where he placed fifth last year. Zaffke established himself as a solid jumper, finishing fifth in the conference outdoor triple jump to earn All-MIAC honorable-mention honors.

Newcomers Steve Houser (Fr., Elk River, Minn.) and Marzel Harris (Fr., Apple Valley, Minn./Eastview HS) should also contribute to the sprinting mix for the Auggies, along with Paul Sanft (Jr., St. Paul, Minn./Johnson HS), who returns to the Auggies after a year's absence.

In a very strong conference for distance running, several Auggies will hope to continue their improvements from last season and from the successful cross country campaign -- including Dan Vogel (Jr., LaCrescent, Minn.), Ryan Nevin (Sr., Barron, Wis.), Riley Conway (Jr., Lake City, Minn.), Micah Lenthe (Fr., Fergus Falls, Minn.), Erik Lundberg (So., Roseville, Minn./Mounds View HS) and George Spears (Sr., Minneapolis, Minn./South HS). Vogel earned All-Region honors and just missed out on All-MIAC honors in cross country in the fall.

"All of the distance guys set personal bests last year in track and they were better this year in cross country, so we're looking for continued improvement this year. They've been training very well this year," Barker said.

In the throws, Jon Dahlin (Sr., St. Louis Park, Minn.) returns to the Auggies after a year's absence. After his year off, Dahlin has shown strong improvement in his technique and strength, and could possibly threaten the school records in the weight throws, Barker said. Newcomer Mike Brinkman (Fr., Fridley, Minn.) will also throw for the Auggies.

Season Preview: After an 8th place finish at the MIAC Championships in 2003, Bethel head coach Mike Goldman is optimistic about the potential his team has to improve upon last year's finish.

With just three graduates last year, 34 student-athletes return to give a solid foundation to score more than the 22 points that was earned last season. Of the 15 athletes that scored points in the conference meet last year, 13 return in addition to eight newcomers that were in their respective state championships in high school.

A pair of juniors, B.J. Hermerding (Buffalo, Minn.) and Ryan Davis (Shelby, Mont.) were the top finishers in their respective events last season. Hermerding had a third place finish in the 55 meter hurdles and Davis finished in second place in the pentathlon. Davis also had a sixth-place finish in the 55 meter hurdles. Senior Justin Speck (Rockford, Ill.) has been a solid performer throughout his career and gave Bethel much needed points last season with a sixth-place finish in the pentathlon.

Juniors Joel Dischinger (New Britain, Conn.) and Adam Erickson (Roseville, Minn.) will also give Bethel potential scorers in the middle distances.

Garrick Larson and the 2003-04 Concordia men's indoor track and field team is hoping that a pair of distance runners and several newcomers will carry the squad to a top ten finish at the conference championship meet.

Larson returns for his 11th season at the helm of the Cobbers and, although the team is down in numbers, has a squad that has the possibility to score points from the sprints to the multi-event. For the first time in awhile, Concordia will have the chance to score solid points in the sprints and the sprint relays as well as the middle distance and distance.

The lead dogs for the Cobbers this season will be middle distance warrior Ben Nylander (Sr., Lisbon, N.Dak.) and new-found distance star Nick Myran. Nylander finished fourth in the 1000 meters at least year's conference indoor meet but struggled through the outdoor season due to leg injuries. Myran busted onto the distance scene last spring by placing third in the 1500 meters at the conference outdoor meet. He backed that performance up by finishing ninth, and earning all-conference honors, at this fall's cross country championship meet.

Several newcomers will play a pivotal role as the Cobbers try to inch their way towards the top of the MIAC. Luke Draxten (So., Fergus Falls, Minn.) will try to make an impact in the high jump. He was one of the kickers on this year's football team and his 6-5 frame should help the Cobbers score points in the jumps. Joining Draxten in the high jump will be David Petit, a promising first-year jumper from Howard Lake, Minn. The sprint corps will feature first-year athletes Ryan Smith (Grand Forks, N.Dak./Red River HS) and Alonzo Jalan (Crookston, Minn.) and sophomore transfer Jay Prince from Bemidji.

Larson will be hoping that the newcomers will learn the training and performance ways of the top dogs as they sled their way towards the conference championship meet in early March.

Fifth-year head coach Paul Schmaedeke will look to captains Will Sallee, David Brosnahan, and Wyatt Ammon to provide leadership in the upcoming season.

Sallee (Sr., Spencer, Wis.) was the conference champion in the 55-meter high hurdles last year with a time of 7.85 and a qualifier for the NCAA Div. III Indoor Championships in the high jump. Sallee set an MIAC meet record in the pentathlon with a score of 3732.

Brosnahan (Jr., Spirit Lake, Iowa) is a multi-event athlete and Ammon (Sr., Dell Rapids, S.D.) runs the 400-meter.

Juniors Chris Fream (Shoreview, Minn.) and Jeff Metzdorff (Wadena, Minn.) will be looked upon to score in the conference meet. Metzdorff, a distance runner, was the leading runner on the cross country team, and Fream placed second in the indoor hurdles at the conference meet last season.

Thrower Ralph Rosario (Jr., St. Paul, Minn.) returns after scoring at the conference meet in the 35-pound weight throw last season.

Joining this year's distance runners include Travis Bristow (Fy., Backus, Minn.), who was the third Piper to cross the finish link at the MIAC Cross Country Championships and Chris Lutz (Fy., Pine City, Minn.), who took eighth place in the Class 'A' state track meet in high school. Middle distance runner Tony Klappa (Fy., Hopkins, Minn.), a 3,200-meter relay performer at the state meet and the Pipers' second finisher in cross country, will be looked upon to contribute.

Sean Smith (Fy., Blue Earth, Minn.), a state meet participant in the 400 meters, Andrew Lehner (Fy., St. Cloud, Minn.) and Andrew Link (Fy., Jordan, Minn.) are all sprinters who will be looked upon to help the Pipers. When Kirk Nauman arrived on the Saint Mary's University campus in early August, he looked at himself as the little fish in the big pond that was SMU track and field.

After all, as Paul Thornton's assistant, Nauman figured he'd have plenty of time to get himself acquainted with the ins and outs of the track and field program - not to mention familiarize himself with the student-athletes.

On Sept., 19, 2003, however, that all changed.

Thornton abruptly stepped down as the Cardinals' head coach, accepting a position as the the head track and field coach at Washington (Mo.) University.

With Thornton's leaving, Nauman suddenly found himself swimming in some uncharted waters.

"It was a bit of an adjustment, going from an assistant coach to being the head coach," admitted Nauman, who spent time as a coach at UW-Superior, Allegheny and, most recently, Minnesota State-Mankato. "3I was pretty excited about coming here as an assistant and getting my feet wet a bit - I never expected when I got here that I would be the head coach."

Yet, here he is, preparing his team - yes, his team - for the upcoming seasons.

"I really like what I've seen so far," he said. "Everyone is working hard. It will be good to get a meet under our belts so we can really see where we're at and what we need to focus on."

At least for the start of the season, Thornton won't be the only one missing from the Cardinal team. Junior Ashley Dingels (Gibbon, Minn.) - last season's Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference champion in both the pentathlon (indoor) and heptathlon (outdoor) - is out indefinitely as she recovers from a torn ACL she suffered during the volleyball season.

"Obviously, when you take someone like Ashley out of your lineup, it hurts in terms of points (at the conference meet)," said Nauman of his junior All-American, who placed seventh overall in the heptathlon at the NCAA Division III National Outdoor Championships. "She was a major contributor for us at the conference meet, and without her, it certainly changes your expectations at the conference meet."

Just what are Nauman's expectations?

In a word = improvement.

"When I look back and evaluate the success of this year, I'm going to look at individual improvement - did we get better in each event. I'm not going to get too caught up in where we finish at the conference championships, but if we continue to improve as the season progresses, I think we are going to score more points (than a year ago).

"We have some very talented individuals, on both the men's and women's sides," continued Nauman. "What we don't have is a lot of depth.

"We have the equivalent of one individual in every event who can get the job done - but the top teams we are going to face have two, three, four individuals who can compete at that highest level.

The Oles lost eight scorers to graduation from the 2003 squad and lost Kelly Fulton to a Semester II off campus program. Fulton was 4th in the 2003 Indoor 3000 and 5000 meters, concluded his 2003 Cross Country season by earning All American honors at the NCAA Championships.

Returning St. Olaf scorers from 2003 include the following athletes who are working to improve on last year's performances:

St. Olaf has several first year students who could possibly make significant contributions including Tom Cruse in the Middle Distance Events, Tony Hoff in the Distance Events, John Lamppa in the Middle Distance Events, Jason Roberts in the Long Jump and Sprints, and Aaron Scholer in the Sprints.

The 2004 Oles have several veteran athletes who with an additional year of maturity and training are possibly ready to make scoring contributions including Dane Hamann (So.) 9th in the 600 yards 1:15.74, Nathan Campbell (Jr.) 11th 600 yards 1:16.10, Malcolm Richards (Jr.) achieved All MIAC Honors in the 2003 Championships returns after placing 12th in the 3000 meters 8:56.04, and 11th in the 5000 meters 15:33.51, Dan Grindstaff after placing 6th in the outdoor 400 M Hurdles could

contribute in the indoor high hurdles as well as either the 400 m or 600 yards, Evan Sundquist (Jr.) missed the 2003 indoor Pentathlon due to injury but placed 3rd in the 2003 outdoor Decathlon should be a prominent figure in the first time contested Indoor Heptathlon. Peter Cathcart (So.) in addition to his Shot Put expertise certainly could score in the 35# Weight with another season of experience and training. Trey Williams (So.) following a successful football season as a starting cornerback and a more holistic training regiment in Track & Field could contribute in the Sprints and Relays

The Oles are coached by veteran coach Bill Thornton, who begins his 34th year as the head coach of track and field. Joining Thornton as assistant coaches are his son, Mark Thornton, a 1990 St. Olaf graduate who now coaches alongside his father. Rob McCarthy also serves as an assistant track and field coach, in addition to his duties as the defensive coordinator for the St. Olaf football team.

St. Thomas in closing in on a conference record for consecutive MIAC team championships as it tries to make it 20 for 20 when the 2004 MIAC men's indoor track championships are held March 5-6 in Collegeville. The St. Olaf men's swimming program holds the record for consecutive championships with won 20 in a row from 1980-1999.

The Tommies have won all 19 indoor meets contested, including a 47.5-point win over runner-up Gustavus in 2003. St. Thomas has won by 30 or more points and scored at least 179 points in 17 of the 19 MIAC indoor championships.

The Tommies have swept the MIAC indoor and outdoor team crowns in each of the last four seasons, and have won 14 of a possible 16 team titles in Mathre's first eight seasons.

The Tommies graduated some key performers, led by five-time All-American and three-time Academic All-American Andrew Hilliard; All-American sprinter Roman Cress; 2X CC All-American Brian Preus; and 2X All-American hurdler Craig Benson. Also, relay All-American Robert Ware didn't return to school. But the Tommies return several top performers from a group which placed 17th at the 2003 outdoor national meet.

Depth has always been a key for St. Thomas, and Mathre has more than 65 athletes expected to compete. In juniors Carson Glad, Cassidy Glad, Jason Schwietz and Tom Hart, and senior Shaun Sharpe, the Tommies have the makings of another elite sprint/relay group. The field events will be led by senior Joe Thomas, the national runner-up last May in the high jump; senior Matt McLaughlin in the weight throw and shot put; and senior Ben Garbe in the triple jump. The Toms' conference champion cross country team should help add scoring in the distance races, led by senior Nate Coleman. Junior Bryce Beckman leds the middle-distance corps, and sophomore Jason Simmons and junior Chris Mattke will lead the hurdles.

Among the newcomers, freshman P.J. Theisen is expected to score well in the long jump, triple jump and 400 hurdles.

The Tommies will get their first good test of 2004 Jan. 31 when they compete in the Iowa State Open in Ames, Iowa.
