Carleton's Hwang, Co-Coaches-of-Year headline MIAC Men's Tennis Awards

BLOOMINGTON, Minn. -- The Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) just concluded a tremendous season on the tennis court and, Tuesday, the top performers from 2015 were recognized with the announcement of the MIAC Men's Tennis Awards.

Carleton senior standout Andrew Hwang headlined the awards announcement as the recipient of the 2015 MIAC Men's Tennis Arthur Ashe Award. The Steve Wilkinson Coach-of-the-Year award was shared by three coaches that all led their teams to tremendous seasons in 2015, as Macalester's Jason Muhl, St. Olaf's Scott Nesbit and Carleton's Stephan Zweifel were all tabbed to share the award by their peers. In addition, the 2015 MIAC All-Conference Singles and Doubles teams were announced, as was the All-MIAC Sportsmanship Team.



Hwang's (Sr., Brookfield, Wis. / University School) selection as the Arthur Ashe Award winner was a result of his outstanding career both on and off the court. The award annually recognizes a senior tennis student-athlete with outstanding sportsmanship and exemplary athletic, academic and humanitarian accomplishments.

This season, Hwang led Carleton to a 23-3 overall record and an 8-1 MIAC mark to finish second in both the regular season and MIAC Playoffs. Hwang received both Singles and Doubles All-Conference honors and finished the season 16-4 in singles play (7-1 MIAC) and 13-8 in doubles matches (5-3 MIAC). In addition, Hwang is also a tremendous student and has completed several successful internships, including one that resulted in a full-time job at Facebook, which he will being following graduation.

The three Coach-of-the-Year co-winners are all MIAC coaching veterans, with Nesbit celebrating his 25th season leading the Oles, Zweifel in year No. 17 at Carleton and Muhl completing his 11th season at Macalester. This is the fifth MIAC Coach-of-the-Year honor for Zweifel (2002-04, 2008). It's the fourth MIAC honor for Nesbit, who was also named Men's Coach-of-the-Year in 1994, and he won the women's honor twice (1991, 1998). It marks the second time Muhl has earned the men's coaching honor (2010) and he also received MIAC Women's Coach-of-the-Year honors in 2008.

Zweifel coached the Knights to a 23-3 overall record, which set a new school record for wins. His team finished 8-1 in conference play and took second in both the MIAC regular-season standings and MIAC Playoffs. Nesbit and Muhl also guided their teams to MIAC Playoff appearances this season, as the Scots finished 9-9 overall and 4-5 in the MIAC and reached the conference quarterfinal match, and the Oles went 8-5 overall and 7-2 in conference play to finish in third place and earn a spot in the MIAC semifinals.

The MIAC Men's Tennis All-Conference Singles and Doubles teams were determined using a point system for conference wins at each position, with the top 18 - including ties - recognized. This season, the All-Conference Singles Team includes 21 players and the Doubles Team includes 20 student-athletes. There were 12 student-athletes that earned both singles and doubles honors in 2015.

The Singles Team includes four seniors, five juniors, seven sophomores and five freshmen. MIAC champion Gustavus led the way with four All-Conference singles players, followed by St. Thomas, St. Olaf and Macalester with three apiece. Carleton, Saint John's and Bethel each had two players recognized, and Concordia and Saint Mary's had one singles player honored apiece.

The Doubles Team features four seniors, eight juniors, five sophomores and three freshmen. Gustavus again led the way with four All-Conference Doubles selections, and Carleton, St. Olaf, St. Thomas, Macalester, Saint Mary's, Saint John's, Bethel and Hamline all had two doubles players recognized apiece.

As part of a conference-wide sportsmanship initiative, the MIAC announced the ninth annual All-MIAC Sportsmanship team for men's tennis. Members of the All-MIAC Sportsmanship team are selected by their coaches and teammates as individuals who demonstrate ideals of positive sportsmanship both on and off the field of competition.
