2016 MIAC Men's Tennis Conference Preview

BLOOMINGTON, Minn. -- The tennis courts around the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) are about to spring to life for the 2016 MIAC men's season and, yet again, the new campaign begins with extremely familiar questions. Can Gustavus Adolphus College continue its quarter-century of dominance, or is this the year one of the challengers finally ends the Gusties' reign?

Gustavus continued its impressive run of unprecedented MIAC success in 2015 with its 27th-straight regular-season conference championship. The title was No. 44 overall for the Gusties, with no other conference school claiming more than 10 titles. Head Coach Tommy Valentini's squad also won its fifth-straight MIAC Playoff title, and finished with a 19-11 overall record, a perfect 9-0 mark in conference play, and an 11-0 record against MIAC opponents.

Carleton also had an incredible season in 2016 with a 23-3 overall record. The Knights were the runners-up in both the regular season with an 8-1 record, and in the MIAC Playoffs with a loss to Gustavus in the championship match. Two of Carleton's three losses came at the hands of the Gusties. St. Olaf finished 7-2 in conference play (8-5 overall) to take third, and St. Thomas joined the top four with a 6-3 MIAC record and an 11-6 overall mark.

Macalester and Saint Mary's shared fifth place in the MIAC standings with identical 4-5 conference records, but the Scots (9-9 overall) grabbed the final spot in the MIAC Playoffs thanks its 5-4 regular-season win over the Cardinals (14-7 overall). Bethel (11-10 overall) and Saint John's (8-10 overall) were also just on the outside looking in at the postseason, as they two tied at 3-6, just a game behind Macalester and Saint Mary's. Hamline (1-8 MIAC, 8-10 overall) and Concordia (0-9 MIAC, 0-13 overall) rounded out the 2015 MIAC standings.

The 2016 season is already under way for a few teams, with the rest to make their debuts in the coming weeks, so fans don't have long to wait to see how everything plays out. Can Gustavus make it 28-straight titles? Will Carleton or another contender finally ascend to the Gusties' level? Which five teams will earn a trip to the MIAC Playoffs, and who will hoist the postseason trophy? It's going to be an exciting three months on tennis courts across the MIAC.

THE POLLS ARE IN

The MIAC coaches don't expect a changing of the guard this year, as they picked Gustavus as the unanimous favorite to win yet another conference title and continue the streak at 28 title in a row. The Gusties received nine first place votes in a system where coaches can't vote for their own team, and 81 total points to sit atop the poll. Carleton - fresh off its 23-win season - was again identified as the top contender to Gustavus' throne with the other first-place vote and 72 total points.

St. Thomas received the No. 3 spot in the poll with 66 points, and St. Olaf was 10 points behind the Johnnies in fourth place with 56 points. The coaches expect Macalester to barely grab the final MIAC Playoff spot once again by a slim margin, with the Scots in fifth with 43 points and Saint John's in sixth, just two points behind Macalester with 41 points.

Bethel was predicted to edge Saint Mary's for seventh place, as the Royals received just four more points than the Cardinals, 33-to-29. Concordia is expected to move up a spot to No. 9 with 17 points in the 2016 poll, with Hamline occupying the final spot with 12 points.

PLAYERS TO WATCH

In their quest for a 28th-straight title, Gustavus has to replace decorated graduates Motasem Alhouni and Brad Entwistle, but the MIAC's dominant program certainly appears poised to keep rolling thanks to the talent coming back. Andres Saenz is a returning All-MIAC senior ready to lead, and star sophomore Mohanad Alhouni is ready to build on his All-American rookie campaign. Fellow sophomore Zach Ekstein is also back and ready for a strong spring after a breakout fall campaign.

The Knights graduated MIAC Arthur Ashe Award winner Andrew Hwang, but Stephan Zweifel has many key pieces back from last season's 23-3 squad. Senior Erik Johnson is back to lead after All-MIAC doubles honors in 2015, and junior Patton McClelland returns after earning All-MIAC singles honors as a sophomore. Sophomore Kevin Mei will return to the top of the Carleton lineup after his outstanding rookie season in 2015.

St. Thomas brings back its entire lineup from 2015 with a trio of All-MIAC players back to lead the way. Senior Brady Radermacher is a three-time All-Conference honoree, and juniors Burke Anderson and Luke Elifson also bring All-MIAC experience to the Tommie lineup. St. Olaf graduated Stephen Nolan, but has All-MIAC seniors Joey Kronzer and Ben Carlson back in the fold, and sophomore Christian Beck returns after contributing as a rookie.



Macalester has each of its top three singles players back from last season's MIAC Playoff run, led by All-MIAC senior Brian Utz. Sophomores Josh Doyle (All-Conference) and Aidan Tirpack also return for the Scots in 2016. Saint John's has nearly its entire lineup back this season as well, led by two-time All-MIAC pick Jack Hansen and fellow All-Conference senior Ben Lahren. Sophomore Tim Larson also returns after earning All-Conference honors in both singles and doubles play as a rookie.

Bethel has the benefit of its top three players all back atop the lineup, all with multiple All-Conference honors in their careers. Juniors Matt Schull and Kolin Kiekhoefer and senior Luke Palmquist lead the Royals as they aim for a Playoff spot. Saint Mary's will again be led by All-MIAC doubles senior Collin Kaczorowski, and sophomore Brett Giesen is back after winning 16 singles matches as a rookie.

Concordia hopes to improve on its 2015 finish with its full lineup back this season, with sophomore Isaac Toivonen returning after earning All-MIAC singles honors as a rookie, and junior Jesse Schneeberger also returns after winning four of his last five matches to end 2015. Hamline also has its entire lineup back intact and will be led by a pair of All-MIAC juniors in David Yanaghita at No. 1 singles and Cody Jahrig at No. 3 singles.

CIRCLE THESE DATES

Fortunately for fans, the anticipation is over. The spring season actually began officially on Jan. 29, and the first MIAC contest of the season - an 8-1 win for Carleton over Saint Mary's - followed on the next day. Things really begin in earnest Saturday and Sunday, with numerous teams opening their season. Despite Mother Nature's winter influence on Minnesota this week, the MIAC teams will take to the indoor courts around the areas and embark on trips to warmer locales to complete a significant number of matches in February and March.

However, the bulk of the conference season will be played in April. Each Saturday in April features ample conference matches. Hopefully, knock on wood, spring has sprung by then and the big questions surrounding the MIAC championship and five MIAC Playoff spots can be answered on the outdoor courts around the league. April 2, 9, 16, and 23 are four of the busiest days for league play, with mid-week matches also prevalent throughout the month.

The final regular-season matches are set for Saturday, April 30, at which time the regular-season champ will be crowned and the conference will announce the five-team Playoff field. The tournament will take place with two quarterfinal matches on Wednesday, May 4, two semifinal matches on Friday, May 6, and the championship on Sunday, May 8. The winner of the MIAC Playoffs will receive the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA Division III Men's Tennis Tournament.

2016 MIAC Men's Tennis Playoffs

The 2016 MIAC Men's Tennis Playoffs won't have any significant changes for the first time in three years. The field will include the top five teams in the conference standings, squaring off in a single-elimination, high-seed host tournament. The No. 4 and 5 seeds will square off on May 4 in the quarterfinals, with the winner joining the top three seeds in the semifinals on May 6. The championship match will be held

May 8 on the home court of the top remaining seed. The winner will receive the MIAC's automatic bid to the 2016 NCAA Division III Men's Tennis Tournament.
