# 2003 MIAC MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY PREVIEW

The 2003 MIAC Men's Cross Country season has begun with several teams contending for the MIAC's top spot. Carleton is the defending champ and will be lead by MIAC coach of the year Bill Terriquez. The Knights lost their two top runners from last season, but return a experienced core of solid runners. St. Olaf finished second last season at the MIAC Championships, but rallied to earn the last (third) National Qualifying place in a tie breaker at the Central Regional Championships. The 2002 season marked the first time in almost twenty-five years a St. Olaf men's team was represented at the NCAA Championships. The Ole's lost some of thier top preformers to graduation, but the 2003 St. Olaf Men's Cross country team returns many letter winners with valuable experience from a very successful 2002 team. Watch for St. Thomas to have a strong 2003 campaign. For Tommies coach Pete Wareham, gone is Brian Preus, a two-time All-American and four-time All-MIAC runner. But coach Wareham still returns four of their first six runners from a team that placed 18th in the 2002 NCAA Championships. Saint John's will also try and reclaim their MIAC dominance, returning three experienced runners from last season. The Johnnies have won four of the last seven MIAC Championships and placed in the top-16 in the country six times since 1995.

The 2003 MIAC Championships will be November 1, 2003 at Como Park in St. Paul, Minn.

## Season Preview:

With virtually everybody back from last year, the goals are simple -- improve on last year's conference and regional finish, and improve on personal-best times that virtually everyone set at last season's regional meet.

"There is a sense of real motivation on both the men's and women's teams this year, having had some success last year with very young teams," said Augsburg head coach Dennis Barker, entering his 10th season. "They want to see how far they can go with it."

With six of the top seven runners returning from last season, there is a definite air of confidence for the Auggie men's cross country team this season. Last year, Augsburg finished eighth at the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championships and had one of its best finishes ever, 13th, at the NCAA Division III Central Regional meet.

This year, Barker is aiming for continued improvement from the experienced men's squad. "We feel like we could be a top-five school in the MIAC and a top-10 school in the region," Barker said.

The key will be in Augsburg's pack style of running, with the top runners staying close to each other and pacing each other, in order to finish with as little a spread of times and scoring places as possible.

"Last year, we got our top-five split down to 46 seconds," Barker said. "This year, if we can keep that kind of split but move the team finish up somewhat, that would help us improve.

"Our strength is going to be the team approach to cross country. We may not have individuals win the conference title, but if we have our whole pack run in the upper part of the race, we're going to do well. This team is a good pack, and they're going to have to succeed or not as a group. This group has good chemistry."

Ryan Nevin (Sr., Barron, Wis.) has been a steady team leader throughout his career. He trimmed his personal-best time to 26:23, a 43rd-place regional finish, last season. He finished 29th at the MIAC championship meet. Combined with a strong track season, in which he set personal bests in both the 5,000 and 10,000 meters, Nevin should continue to lead by example.

Dan Vogel (Jr., LaCrescent, Minn.) cut his best time by 1:20 during the course of last season, and continued his improvement in both track in the spring and through summer running, Barker said. The same can be said for Riley Conway (Jr., Lake City, Minn.), who trimmed 1:42 over 8,000 meters during the course of his first collegiate cross country campaign.

George Spears (Sr., Minneapolis, Minn./South HS) has showed significant improvement each season of his collegiate career, and this year should be no exception, Barker said. Spears made a 40-second personal improvement from the beginning to the end of last season.

Erik Lundberg (So., Roseville, Minn./Mounds View HS) could be one of the most improved runners on the team this season, Barker said. In just his second year of cross country running last year, he cut 1:04 off his personal best time during the course of the season. In the track season, he earned finalist honors in the MIAC steeplechase.

Jason Edwards (Sr., Fergus Falls, Minn.) also returns to the Auggies after a successful 2002 season. Edwards cut his previous personal-best time by more than two minutes last year.

Newcomers to the program include Micah Lenthe (Fr., Fergus Falls, Minn.), Donovan Lessard (Fr., International Falls, Minn.), Tom Robinson (Fr., Wayzata, Minn.), Eric Foley (Fr., Minneapolis, Minn./South HS), Adam Johnson, Korey Leland and Cole Ashburn.

# Garrick Larson enters his seventh year as head coach of the Concordia men's cross country team and he will have to use all his coaching knowledge to help his young and inexperienced team through the rigors of the 2003 men's cross country season. Larson will have to find replacements for four of the top five runners from the 2002 season. The only top five runner from a year ago is junior Nick Myran who has shown glimpses of being able to compete with the league's elite runners. Myran finished as the team's top runner in the NCAA regional meet last fall, and won the first race in 2003 as he bettered all the runners from NAIA power Jamestown in an early season meet. Joining Myran as the Cobber's top two runners will be senior Ben Nylander. Nylander was coming off an injury during the 2002 season so he was not able to perform at his top level. He started to return to form during the 2003 outdoor track and field season, finishing sixth in the 3000 meter steeplechase at the MIAC Outdoor Championship Meet.

## Season Preview:

St. Thomas coach Pete Wareham graduated Brian Preus, a two-time All-American and four-time All-MIAC runner. But the Tommie's still return four of their first six runners from a team that placed 18th in the 2002 NCAA Championships. Leading returnees include seniors Nate Coleman (93rd nationals) and Sean Brenckman (154th nationals); sophomore Jim Hull (177th nationals); and junior Brock Stephan (191st nationals.).

Also, sophomore Derek Harmon, the Tommie's' 11th finisher at the 2002 conference meet in 69th-place overall, appears ready for a breakout season. He ran with the Tommie's' lead pack runners at the team's Aug. 30 three-mile time trial. Wareham's distance runners helped the St. Thomas sweep the conference indoor and outdoor team championships in 2003. In the MIAC outdoor meet in May, Brenckman took fifth in the 10,000 and seventh in the 5,000, while Stephan was sixth in the 1,500. Two freshmen also competed well and hope to push for top-seven spots this fall -- Will Hawthorne was third in the 5,000, and John Schwerkoske was 13th in the 10,000.After a third-place finish in 2002, St. Thomas will try to regain the MIAC championship in the Nov. 1 competition. The Tommies also will look to qualify a team to nationals for the seventh year in a row. Their 23 all-time team appearances at the NCAA meet are tied for second most among Division III programs.
