2005 MIAC MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY PREVIEW

The St. Olaf Oles won their first MIAC men's cross country championship in 28 years this past season and look to grab the top spot once again in 2005. Head coach Bill Thornton leads a strong group of returners including Juniors Tony Hoff and Sam Hauck. Hoff finished tenth at the MIAC's, 18th at the Central Regional and 77th in the NCAA Championships last fall. Hauck was All-MIAC and an all-region runner last fall, finishing 12th at conference and 23rd at the regional meet.

One of the teams looking to dethrone the Oles are the Knights from Carleton. The Knights were ranked 12th nationally in the preseason coaches poll and showed they deserved that ranking with a first place finish in their season opening meet. Also looking to grab a top spot in the MIAC rankings is Macalester. The Scots return a strong group of runners from a team that finished fourth in the conference last season.

Both St. Thomas and Hamline will be looking to take that next step to being an elite team in the conference. St. Thomas and Hamline finished third and fifth respectively and each return a strong core of runners.

The Johnnies, Gusties, Auggies, Cobbers, Royals and Cardinals will be looking for an improvement from last season's finish with an eye on the top half of the conference standings.

The 2005 MIAC Championships will be October 29, 2005 at Como Park in St. Paul, Minn.

Season Preview:

The Gustavus men's cross country team looks to continue its slow rise toward the top of the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. After posting three consecutive ninth place finishes in the MIAC Cross Country Championships from 2000-02, the Gusties came through with an eighth place finish in 2003 and a seventh place finish last season.

The goal for the Gusties this season will be to improve the team's standing at the conference meet. "We want to be at least top six," noted Head Coach Jed Friedrich. "St. Olaf and Carleton are traditionally very strong, Saint John's returns a lot of runners from last year, and St. Thomas is usually up there." Behind those four schools, however, Friedrich sees a wide-open race.

Four of seven runners return from the group that posted a 14th place finish at the NCAA Central Region meet in 2004. Leading the Gusties will be Alex Zupan (Junior, Monona, Wisc.), Nathan Barten (Senior, Delano, Minn.), Andy Rishavy (Senior, Alexandria, Minn.) and Dan Westlund (Senior, Northfield, Minn.). Zupan picked up all-conference honors with his 11th place finish in last year's MIAC meet and, according to Friedrich, logged a lot of practice miles over the summer. For Barten and Westlund, the key to success in 2005 will be their ability to manage minor injuries sustained during training this past summer.

Friedrich will look to a number of first-year and sophomore runners to fill the spots vacated by the graduation of Brent Magnusson, James Sorenson and Tom Westlund. Sorenson recorded the highest Gustie finish in the 2004 Central Region Meet, with a 45th place time.

"We have a pretty solid freshman," said Friedrich, "and we need a few guys to make the jump [into a varsity role]." Those first-year runners expected to have a chance to crack the top five are Jeff Pedersen (Plymouth, Minn.), Ryan Brownell (Hibbing, Minn.), and John Leaf (Center City, Minn.).

Gustavus reported for pre-season training on August 24 and will open the season September 3 against former Gustie harriers at the Alumni Meet in St. Peter. The squad's first test against outside competition will be at the Saint John's Invitational on September 10 in Collegeville, Minn.

Season Preview:

Experience is the name of the game for the Hamline University men's cross country team as the squad of accomplished veterans prepares for another season. Led by head coach Paul Schmaedeke, in his 18th season at the helm for the Pipers, the team is looking to continue moving up after finishing fifth at the MIAC Championships a season ago – six points away from third place.

"One of the biggest keys to cross country success is summer preparation," Schmaedeke said. "This group has prepared as well if not better than any other group that I have worked with during my time at Hamline."

The pack will continue to be paced by a strong core group of upperclassmen. The Pipers are returning six seniors and five juniors who will carry their tradition of improvement into their final season with the team.

Senior Jeff Metzdorff (Wadena, Minn.) will again spark the success of the team. Metzdorff finished fourth in at the MIAC Championships and qualified for the NCAA National Meet last season, after a 13th place finish at the NCAA Central Regional Meet. At the NCAA Div. III Cross Country National Meet, Metzdorff ran a personal best, moving up from 100th place to 67th in the last two miles and posting a time of 25:40.4.

Metzdorff proved to be one of the best distance runners in the nation, placing seventh to earn All-America status in the 10000 meters at the NCAA Div. III Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Seniors Ned Branigan (Roseville, Minn.), Mark Bowden (Maple Grove, Minn.), and Josh Piotrowski (Wausau, Wis.) will also be competing in their last season for the Pipers. This group of athletes helped lead the Hamline squad to a fifth place finish at the MIAC Championships last season, up a position from the previous season.

Hamline's group of five juniors was among the front of the pack in all of the team's meets last season. At the CSB/SJU Invitational, Hamline captured five of the top seven spots, four of which were juniors. The top five runners for the Pipers were only 34 seconds apart. At CSB/SJU, Metzdorff won the race and was followed by Tony Klappa (Hopkins, Minn.), Chris Yotter (Annandale, Minn.), and Travis Bristow (Pine River, Minn.) in second, third, and sixth, respectively.

Klappa had the most success of the juniors. After finishing 20th at the MIAC Championships, Klappa competed at the regional meet where was given All-Region honors after running a personal best. Klappa also won an individual championship in the 1500 meters at the conference indoor meet. He will continue to be a driving force of the team.

In addition to the dominating upperclassmen, Hamline is looking for improvement and growth among the younger athletes. Sophomores Brandon Gleason (Mantorville, Minn.), Paul Comery (Portland, Ore.), Dan Peterson (Edina, Minn.), and Dan Steinbrecher (Hinckley, Minn.) will enter their second year with more confidence and determination as they follow the path paved before them by the upperclassmen. Steinbrecher was the third Piper to cross the finish line at the MIAC Championships and regional meet.

The team is enthusiastic to see what the new athletes will bring to the squad in their first year with Hamline. Jeremy Arbid (Mountain Lake, Minn.), Kevin Groh (Austin, Minn.), Jon Murphy (North St. Paul, Minn.), Mike Richards, and Jeff Richards will step onto the team and learn the tradition of success and determination shown to them by the returning athletes. The Richards brothers finished third and fifth in the Class A state meet last season, leading their team to the state championship.

Season Preview:

Fourth-place finishes at each of the past two MIAC championship meets, and a seventh-place Central Region finish in 2005 as the third MIAC team, have the Scots looking to break into the top three in the conference and perhaps challenge for the title in '05 under third-year coach Matt Haugen. Bo Rydze, the team's top runner for the past two years, has graduated, along with Eric Olson, who was Mac's first and second runner at the last two regional championships. However, some of the younger harriers made great progress last spring in track and could step up among the MIAC's top runners.

Team captain Roscoe Sopiwnik (Sr., Frederic, Wis.) earned all-conference status when he placed 14th at last season's MIAC championships, while Dylan Keith (Jr., Soldiers Grove, Wis. / North Crawford) picked up honorable mention all-conference honors after finishing 23rd. Keith went on to a productive track season, earning All-MIAC honors with a third-place finish outdoors in the 5000 meters. He was also fifth in the indoor 5000.

Nate Crider (So., Downers Grove, Ill. / North) and Josh Springer (So., Portland, Ore. / Cleveland) were two of the MIAC's top young middle distance runners in track and should progress nicely as sophomores. They both made it into the finals last spring in the 800-meter run at the MIAC championships. Matt Wegmann (So., North Oaks, Minn. / Mounds View) is another key soph, who along with Crider, ran up into the team's top-five pack in 04.

Three more returning Scots have previous experience as top-seven team runners at the regional championships: David Auguston (Jr., Sheboygen, Wis. / North) and Jordan Selbo (Sr., Amherst, Mass.). Auguston was sixth at last winter's MIAC indoor meet in the 1000 meters. Kyle Bream (So., Burnsville, Minn.), will also be a key contributor for MAC this season.

Mac's third season under Coach Haugen begins Sept. 10 at the Luther All-America Race in Decorah, Ian. The Scots have meets hosted by St. Olaf, Loyola of Chicago, Wisconsin-Eau Claire and Wisconsin-La Crosse before racing in the Oct. 29 MIAC championships. '05 Mac Schedule

Coach Haugen likes the depth of his team, which is expected to receive strong leadership from the senior and junior classes. It is likely that a few sophomores will make the jump to the front running pack, and that an incoming first year runner will give Macalester a solid pack of 12 that can challenge for the team's top five spots. With five Central Region teams qualifying for the NCAA championships this season, Haugen believes this is the year that the Scots can return to nationals for the first time since 1983.

"We are going to need some of our younger runners to step up right away. You hate to rely on your freshmen and sophomores to fill leadership roles — both on the trails and off — but we are going to have to this year."	
	"Last year was a tough year from an injury standpoint — we were never able to put together a completely healthy lineup," said Berndt. "Hopefully that won't be the problem this year.
