2005 MIAC VOLLEYBALL PREVIEW

The 2005 MIAC volleyball season gets underway with non-conference games beginning September 1. Conference play begins September 14, with teams competing against each other one time in MIAC play.

Three MIAC teams are represented in the top 25 of the CSTV/AVCA preseason coach's poll. Concordia tops the list of MIAC teams, ranking 15th, followed by Carleton at 17 and St. Benedict at 18. The coaches in the MIAC voted the Blazers of St. Benedict and their five returning starters and 11 returning letterwinners to the top of class in their preseason poll. St. Thomas returning 4 starters to go along with 10 letterwinners grabs the second spot followed by last season's conference tournament champion Concordia. Rounding out the top five is Carleton and Macalaster.

The MIAC Volleyball Playoffs will use the same format as last year and all playoff games will begin at 7:00p.m. The top six teams from the MIAC regular season again qualify for the playoffs. Quarterfinals will take place on Tuesday, November 1. The #1 and #2 seeds will host semifinal matches on Thursday, Nov. 3 and the highest remaining seed will host the championship match Saturday, Nov. 5. The winner of the playoff will receive the MIAC's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament.

Season Preview:

New head coach Jessica Phillips has a promise for fans of Augsburg College volleyball this season.

"Our goal is to always be the scrappiest team in the gym, the team that goes for every ball. We'll keep the ball off the floor and compete on every play," Phillips said. "With this team, our wins are going to come from outworking our opponents and ball control. We don't have a huge lineup, so the focus this season is going to be on those two things."

And with that focus, the first-year Auggie mentor hopes to help the team improve from last season's 9-16 overall record and 1-10 mark in the competitive Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

Augsburg returns three-year starters Billie Painschab (Sr., Howard Lake, Minn./Howard Lake-Waverly HS) and Linnea Evans (Sr., Kenyon, Minn./Kenyon-Wanamingo HS) to the 2005 lineup, two players who have developed into strong team leaders.

"This year, our leadership is going to be a key," Phillips said. "Linnea and Billie are great people to have in the leadership roles. I don't think I could have inherited two better leaders. It's a great position to walk into. They've expressed to me how excited they are for the season ... They're excited for what we can accomplish. I've put a lot of responsibility on their shoulders, but only because I can and I know they can handle it."

Painschab has developed into a solid middle hitter, leading the team last year in both hitting (257 kills, 3.10 per game, .249 attack percentage) and blocking (65/19 solo). Evans, an outside hitter, has become a strong allaround player, contributing 204 kills (2.87 per game) and 22 blocks last season, to go along with 231 digs and 26 service aces.

"Billie will definitely be one of our go-to players. I'm hoping she can continue to stand out as one of the better players in the conference. She's going to get a lot of balls passed her way this year, and that's what she wants," Phillips said. "Linnea, with her experience, has developed a lot of good shots. She's a smart player. She's got good ball control, which is huge out of the left-side position. We want to put someone there who can not only terminate the play, but also play defense and pass well."

Alexis Johnson (Sr., Oakdale, Minn./North St. Paul HS) returns for her second season as Augsburg's primary setter, after averaging 10.09 sets per game last season. With a transition to a "6-2" offense in the works, Phillips hopes to allow Johnson to also develop as a hitter and blocker, along with transitioning Haley Bower (So., Brainerd, Minn.) from the right side to the setting position.

Another solid all-around player, Sarah Bradley (So., International Falls, Minn.) returns as an outside hitter. She averaged 2.20 kills per game in her freshman season, while leading the team in digs (270) and service aces (39). Katie LaGrave (So., Okinawa, Japan/Kadena HS) saw more time in the lineup as the season progressed last year, becoming a strong compliment to Painschab in the middle.

Outside hitter Britt Bogner (Sr., Burnsville, Minn./Apple Valley HS) also returns to the lineup, along with sophomore outside hitters Kristina Lurken (So., Kenyon, Minn./Kenyon-Wanamingo HS) and libero Emma Sutton (So., Chicago, Ill./Mother McAuley HS).

Season Preview:

After a disappointing 10-20 season, the Royals are looking to use their mix of experienced returners and athletic newcomers to rebound to the top of the MIAC Conference. After qualifying for the MIAC Tournament in each of Coach Gretchen Hunt's first three seasons, the Royals finished in a tie for 8 th in 2004. However, as they return five starters, plus their libero, and ten letter winners, the Royals look to once again challenge for the conference title.

Leading the way are senior captains Kimmie Moehring (OH, Minnetonka), Katie Snyder (S, Alexandria), Lisa Murphy (MB, Plymouth/Southwest Christian), Lauren Paist (Utility, Wheaton, IL.) and Joyanne Johnston (Opp., Worthington). As a three-year starter and the sole All-MIAC selection for the Royals in 2004, Moehring will have a lot of responsibility on her shoulders. "Kimmie is our anchor is many ways," says Hunt. "She is one of the best defensive players I've ever seen, and brings so much experience to the floor." Moehring finished last season with 438 digs. Also a three-year starter, Snyder will lead the Royals' offense from the setter position. Snyder finished 2004 with a team leading 1,166 assists. According to Hunt, "Katie is a great leader at the setter position and I will really look to her to run the show on the floor this year." Paist and Murphy (formerly Lisa Otto) both have two years as starters under their belts and played big roles for Bethel at the end of the 2004 season. "Lisa was our most efficient hitter at the end of the season and Lauren established herself as one of our better blockers and servers," says Hunt. Johnston has not seen much action on the floor, but is one of the quiet leaders on the team. "Joy loves the game of volleyball and is a servant to her teammates. She will play an important 'behind-the-scenes' role."

Two underclassmen who made big impacts as freshmen also return. Kayla Smith (Libero, Lakeville) and Liz Glesne (OH, Underwood) both ended the season as starters. Glesne led the Royals in kills, with 363 and Smith led in digs with 5.36 per game. Both were some of the top performers at their position in the MIAC. Other returning players who look to challenge for Varsity time include Amy Anderson (OH, Alexandria), Pam Feltmann (S/Opp., Young America/Mayer Lutheran), Alissa Martin (MB, Williams Bay, WI.), and Laura Naig (S., Kasson).

There are a few newcomers to the Royal line-up that could make an immediate impact in 2005. Transfer students Nicole Murphy (Jr., Irondale; Wartburg College), Angie Nies (So., Alexandria; Minnesota State Community and Technical College at Fergus Falls), and Christa Crabtree (So., Fergus Falls; Concordia-Moorhead College) will add immediate depth and experience at their positions. In addition to the transfer students, a couple familiar faces will be making a return to the Royals after a season off. Sophomore Lindsay Flowers (MB/Opp., Kirkland, WA.) is also returning after a year away to rehabilitate an injury. "Lindsay is a gifted volleyball player with a great knowledge of the game," says Hunt. "She brings positive energy, experience, and leadership to the court."

As for the freshmen, Stephanie Brandt (Arrowhead H.S., WI.) should immediately challenge for playing time at the outside hitter position. "Steph is an explosive athlete with a powerful swing," according to Coach Hunt. "I look for her to push a lot of upperclassmen for playing time." In addition, there is a trio of middle blockers that will get an opportunity for playing time with the loss of two middle blockers from the 2004 team. Lauren Darrell (Woodbury/New Life Academy), who is a sophomore at Bethel but a first-year volleyball player and Jennifer Stoa (Brooklyn Park/Concordia Academy) will both be in competition for immediate playing time.

Rounding out the list of newcomers is Amber Beasley (S. Medina/West Lutheran), Chelsea Falck (OH, Abundant Life, WI.), Lauren McConkey (MB, St. Clair), and Karina Roe, (S, Long Prairie-Grey Eagle).. Arnstrom, Beasley, Falck, and Roe have garnered All-Conference honors in their respective conferences and were multi-sport athletes in high school. McConkey has only played volleyball for a year but is a highly decorated basketball athlete that was able to transfer her athletic ability to volleyball, as she was a conference leader in blocks her first year.

Returning Starters/Letterwinners: 4 /12 Entering the 2004 season, the Carleton College volleyball program had posted three straight seasons of Season Preview: improved overall records and MIAC finishes. Last season witnessed the Knights making the final ascent to the top of the conference standings, as they won the program's first conference title, posted their best winning percentage in more than two decades and were nationally ranked for the bulk of the season. The summit, in essence, had been reached. Fast forward to the start of the 2005 campaign. The Knights, with three returning starters and their starting libero back, plus a talented group of newcomers, look to remain on top and add another banner to the wall of West Gym. They'll enter the season ranked 17th in the American Volleyball Coaches Association's (AVCA) preseason top 25 poll. If Carleton is going to become only the fifth MIAC school to repeat at regular-season volleyball champions, it must do so without graduated seniors Katie Freeman, Beth Freeman and Sarah Barrow. Katie Freeman paced the Knights in kills the past two seasons and was a two-time All-MIAC and 2004 AVCA All-America honorable mention pick. Beth Freeman, an 2004 AVCA All-American third team pick, and Barrow were forces at the net that must be replaced. All three were four-year starters for head coach Heidi Jaynes, who repeated as MIAC coach of the year in 2004 and added 2004 AVCA regional coach of the year honors as well. She needs only $15\,$ wins to reach the 100-win mark in her career entering the season. 'The best thing those three did for us is they built some tradition here and they were really great leaders," Jaynes said of her three graduating seniors. "That trickled down to the players who will be captains this year. We have some great freshmen coming in but also some really good sophomores and juniors. Losing those three seniors is a big deal but we have some kids who have worked hard to step into those roles." The Knights do return 12 letterwinners from a 22-3 squad that won 10 of their 11 conference matches. Highlighting the returnees is outside hitter Danielle Hargreaves (Jr./Brandon, Manitoba/Vincent Massey Collegiate). She ranked second on the team with 3.07 kills per game and second with 3.60 digs per game. Senior Alivia Bryan (Eugene, Ore./Winston Churchill) posted a breakout junior campaign, ranking third on the 2004 club with 2.94 kills per game and third in blocks with 0.75/game. She more than tripled her kill output and doubled her block output from 2003. Setter Heather La Chapelle (So./Eagan, Minn.) is also back a year after setting a Carleton single season record with 10.45 assists/game en route to earning the MIAC's first-year player of the year honors. Carleton's starting libero, senior Jamie Lykken (Edina, Minn.), earned All-MIAC honors a year ago as she averaged 5.25 digs per game. She ranked fourth in the conference in digs and seventh in aces and reached the 1,000-dig plateau for her career.

Jaynes pointed to the senior class as a key once again for the Knights, and in particular Lykken. "She'll run the whole back row defensively and she's just a great leader," Jaynes said. "Alivia has worked hard over the summer and she's excited for her senior year." Jaynes expects Bryan to have another outstanding season, along with fellow senior Jess Black (Greenwood, Colo./Cherry Creek).

| The biggest reason for the exuberance of Mosser can be found in the 6-2 frame of All-American Becca Shane. Shane has matured into the most feared middle hitter in the conference. She led the team in kills last season with 376 and in her first two seasons of competition has amassed 736 winners. Joining Shane on the frontline will be sophomore two-sport athlete Michelle Honek. Honek progressed slowly in her freshman season in 2004 but finished with a flourish as she recorded double-digit kill totals in three of her last five matches against MIAC opponents. The Shane/Honek tandem will provide a strong hull for the Cobber ship in the beginning of the year. The ability of Concordia to cut through the treacherous waters of the MIAC will depend on how quickly the frontline newcomers figure out the speed of the college game. |

Another potential iceberg in the waters could be finding a replacement for all-everything setter Jessica Walden. Walden finished her career as the school's all-time assist leader and led the Cobbers in assists for four consecutive seasons. Mosser never had to worry about long stretches of sub-par offense because of Walden's ability to control the tempo of a match and her leadership qualities on the court. Most likely, the job of running the Cobber offense will fall on the shoulders of a first-year player. A quartet of would-be helmsmen have the high school credentials to assume the starting role. Alyssa Dahl was the MVP and captain of the Willmar High School team last year, Jill Hance was the captain and all-conference setter at Benilde–St. Margaret's High School, while Anna Tinkham was a three-year all-conference performer at Fisher High School and Jen VanBenthuysen was a three-time all-conference player at Prior Lake High School.

Those four will be joined by several other candidates as Mosser will try to find the best fit for the team before the first MIAC match against St. Thomas on September 14.

Gustavus Adolphus College volleyball coach Kari Eckheart hopes her 2005 squad can build from a 2004 season that saw them fall one win shy of the 20-win plateau but make their first Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Tournament appearance since 2000. If they are to do so, it will be with a line-up high on talent, but relatively low on experience. Gustavus enters the season with one senior on the roster.

The 2005 roster will look significantly different from a year ago as seven first-year players emerged from preseason drills with jerseys. Despite plenty of new faces this season, the goal will remain the same. "We want to be in the top six in the conference and make the MIAC Tournament. I don't want to put a number of wins out there, we just want to be in the tournament," Coach Eckheart commented.

Among the losses to graduation for the Gusties are defensive specialist Sue Dailey and two-time All-MIAC selection Rachel Batalden. Last season's other all-conference selection, Tara Houlihan (Senior, Sioux Falls, S.D.) will be studying abroad during the fall semester.

Replacing Batalden, Houlihan, Dailey and Anne Osthus, who did not return to the team, will be no small task for the Gusties. However, with experienced youngsters returning from last season there is optimism. "Offensively we are going to be strong. We have some experienced hitters and I also expect that we will do well blocking the ball," Eckheart commented.

Eckheart expects that junior Rachelle Jakobs (Montevideo, Minn.) will step in at setter in place of Batalden. Sophomore Bri Alsides is a candidate to step up and fill one of the defensive specialist positions. Alsides recorded 241 kills last season.

Sophomores Andrea Kron (Cold Spring, Minn.) and Jennifer Thelemann (Le Sueur, Minn.) return to the outside hitter and right side hitter positions, respectively. Lone senior Kristi Forsythe (Forest Lake, Minn.) will compete for time at outside hitter.

In the middle, junior Becca Thompson (Mankato, Minn.) returns, while Jami Moseng (Sophomore, Montevideo, Minn.) and incoming first-year Kelsey Aamlid (Sioux Falls, S.D.) will compete for the other middle position. First-year Emily Klein (Red Wing, Minn.) is slated to step in at libero following a very productive pre-season camp.

Despite the loss of six letter-winners, the Gusties have begun to build a nucleus of young talent. Gustavus travels west to open the season, venturing to Oregon to participate in the Boxer Kickoff Invitational hosted by Pacific University. Viterbo will open the 2005 home schedule September 9, while the Gusties are at Hamline September 14 for their first MIAC test.

With the 2005 Pipers growing into a mature and experienced group with several returners, head volleyball coach Gina Rollie hopes to implement a new offense that will allow the Pipers to move up in the competitive MIAC.

Rollie hopes to install a three-middle offense to allow the Pipers to keep their most productive players on the court.

"This should provide more options offensively and challenge other teams to prepare a little differently for us," Rollie said.

The system rewards multi-skilled athletes, but is more complicated than schemes run in the past.

"We are trying to get our best players on the floor," Rollie said. "We feel like we have some versatile players – not dominating at one thing, but good all-around players. Offensively, it will help us get the ball to our better hitters. It allows us to get (juniors) Dana (Luiken) and Heather (Rich) the ball in a variety of locations along the net."

Luiken, a two-year starter at middle hitter, led the Pipers in kills last season with 223. She was also excellent with the serve, delivering 41 aces. The Chatfield, Minn. native posted 10 or more kills in eight matches in 2004 with the Pipers going 7-1 in those matches. Hamline finished the season with an 11-16 record, 1-10 in the MIAC.

Feeding Luiken the ball will be sophomore setter Angie Asmus (Plymouth, Minn.). As a first-year, Asmus dished out 880 assists – the third highest season total in Hamline history. Asmus also led the team and was third in the MIAC with 53 service aces. She did all of this after severely breaking a finger halfway through the season. Rollie believes that a healthy Asmus could have a breakout year.

Three-time MIAC defensive player of the year May Lin Kessenich graduated so back-row play will be a concern going into the season, but the Scots return five starters and bring in some recruits capable of stepping in right away.

Mac is led at the net by veterans Lauren Eberhart (Jr., Madelia, Minn.) and Maggie Buttermore (Sr., Lincoln, Neb. / East). Eberhart ranked second in the MIAC in kills per game as a sophomore and should once again be one of the league's most-feared hitters. Buttermore led the team in blocks and hitting percentage, and is also reliable in the back row and serving. Last season Eberhart spiked 4.0 kills per game with a .239 hitting percentage. Buttermore added 2.4 kills, 0.94 blocks and 2.2 digs as a .290 hitter.

Bonnie Driscoll (Jr., LeMars, Ia. / Gehlen Catholic) provided 2.4 kills per game and Stephanie Nelson (Jr., St. Paul, Minn. / Highland Park) was second on the team in blocks with 0.58 per game. Kari Tanaka (So., Bloomington, Minn. / Kennedy) and Briana Keefe-Oates (So., Encinitas, Calif. / San Dieguito Academy) shared setting duties a year ago and enjoyed solid frosh campaigns. Keefe-Oates provided 8.9 assists per game and Tanaka averaged 7.3. Kate Heidinger (Jr., Albion, Ill. / Edwards County) and Deni Batchvarova (Sr., Pleven, Bulgaria / Mathematical) should compete for the libero position vacated by Kessenich. Kate Fahje (So., Waukesha, Wis. / South) should move up to the varsity and see action on the right side for the Scots.

Coach Schleuder has brought in a strong crop of recruits who will challenge for playing time right away. Leading the way will be Michigan State transfer Andrea Hansen (Jr., Andover, Minn. / Anoka) and Sonia Muzikarova (Fy., Bratislava, Slovakia / Bilikova).). Hansen played in about a third of Michigan State's total games last year and averaged 0.81 blocks per game. She was a .260 hitter with 1.45 kills per game.

UST secured the school's sixth consecutive 20-win volleyball season in 2004 with its 20-14 finish. The Toms tied for third in the conference with an 8-3 MIAC record, including three five-game losses. In the MIAC playoffs, they won a first-round match over Gustavus but were eliminated in the semifinals by Carleton.

Third-year Coach Thanh Pham graduated an All-American hitter in Amie Lee Aschenbeck and had another player leave school, but returns 10 of his top 13 players. Senior Erika Wetzel needs 68 kills to reach 1,000 on her career.

Top freshmen include setter Molly Conway of Cedar Falls, Iowa, DS Katie Kramer of Rocori HS, MB Katie McCaffrey of Fort Collins, Colo., and OH Jenna Pont (FR, OH, 5-10), Omaha (Neb.) Skutt HS.

The 2005 Tommies will play another strong non-conference schedule. They open the season with four matches in the New York University tournament, Sept. 2-3. They'll face NYU (40-7, fourth-place NCAA finisher in 2004), SUNY-Geneseo (25-16) and UW-Stevens Point (21-14) in the first rounds.

Other 20-win teams from last year on the Tommies' schedule include UW-Oshkosh (22-11), Central (Iowa) (28-9) and UW-River Falls (24-11). Besides New York City, the Tommies will play tournaments at St. Mary's, Wartburg and Simpson (Iowa), and UW-River Falls.

UST faces five conference powers in the first 18 days of its MIAC schedule, begining Sept. 14 at No. 15-ranked Concordia. Their first home match is Sept. 21 at home vs. No. 18-ranked St. Ben's. The Blazers and Tommies were picked first and second in the MIAC Coaches' preseason poll.

New assistant coaches for UST are Dave Manka and Brad Voosen. Last year's top assistant coach, Dennis Amundson, was hired as head coach at Minnesota State Mankato. Dave Orren also will return as an assistant.

The Tommies had tryouts and cut the varsity and junior varsity to 27 player.
