

2003 MIAC WOMEN'S GOLF PREVIEW

The 2003 MIAC Women's Golf season is underway. The University of St. Thomas, 2001 and 2002 defending MIAC Champions, will try and retain their title despite graduating four of their top six golfers from last season. Watch for Concordia College to try and continue their dominence at the conference championship. Concordia has won nine of the eleven team championships since the beginning of the MIAC Women's Golf Championship in 1991, including six straight from 1995 to 2000. Also keep an eye on Gustavus, second place finisher in 2001 and 2002, to challenge for the top stop in the conference this fall. The 2002 MIAC Women's Golf co-coaches of the year were Mike Boschee (GAC) and Cathy Lombritto (UST).

The 2003 MIAC Women's Golf Championship will take place October 4th andf 5th at Cedar Valley Golf Course in Winona, Minn.

Season Preview:

For the decade-long history of the Augsburg College women's golf team, it appeared that the only constant thing was "change," with eight coaches in nine seasons, including five in the last four seasons, and a program history filled with stops and starts.

Now, the Auggies want to see a different word starting with C associated with women's golf -- "consistency."

Last spring, Troy Nygaard and Laura Levi were hired as co-coaches for the Auggie women's golf program. And with their hiring has come the beginnings of what could be a resurgence in the sport at Augsburg.

Already, the Auggies have the largest roster in school history, with nine golfers making commitments to compete in the fall half of the season. And among the five recruits -- the most ever in a single season -- are several talented golfers who should make immediate impacts for the Auggies this season.

Consistency could be just around the corner for the Auggie women's golf program as it enters its 10th season.

Both Nygaard and Levi enter the Auggie program with plenty of experience in the Twin Cities golf scene. Both work for the Three Rivers Park District (formerly Hennepin Parks) and are based out of the Eagle Lake Golf Course in Plymouth, Minn., Nygaard as the course's operations supervisor and Levi as an instructor with a focus on youth golf.

The coaching duo have made a commitment to build the program through recruiting and instruction, with a goal of making the program an enjoyable one to be in for a player's four-year career.

With just two seniors and one junior, the Auggie roster will be a young one, but a talented bunch that could help the team improve from its eighth-place finish at last season's Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championship meet.

Jackie Jacobs (Sr., Canton, S.D.) has experienced the recent history of Auggie golf firsthand, entering her fourth year in the program. She has consistently lowered her score during her tenure at Augsburg, trimming her stroke average 16 strokes in three seasons, to a career-best 103.79 strokes per 18-hole round last year.

A solid sophomore duo should continue to set the pace for the Auggies in 2003-04. Micaela Pommerening (So., Hopkins, Minn./Blake HS) had one of the best individual seasons in school history last year, with a 93.43 stroke average (92.17 in the spring half) and two rounds in the 80s.

Brooke Hamann (So., Perham, Minn.) made strong strides during her first collegiate campaign, edging close to the century mark in average with a 101.52 mark.

Julie Dick (Sr., Minnetonka, Minn./Hopkins HS) has continued to show improvement in her individual game, and returns for her senior season, just her third in competitive golf.

Nygaard and Levi are encouraged by a solid recruiting class, including transfer Darcy Aadland (Jr., Golden Valley, Minn.) and two freshmen who had outstanding state junior golf careers, Kelsey Boler (Fr., Eden Prairie, Minn./Minnehaha Academy HS) and Marisa Navarro (Fr., Rochester, Minn./Century HS). Freshmen Angela Berktold and Katherine Gavin (Fr., Lake City, Minn.) will also join the program.

Season Preview:	The Carleton Knights, in their sixth season as a varsity golf program, will field its most talented and accomplished team in the short history of the team in 2003-04.	
	A pair of sophomores who paced the team last year return in Kelly Lewis and Kate Waller (pictured left). Lewis was one of the region's top-ranked players the entire season and paced the team with an 86.06 stroke average. She finished in the top 10 in 6 of 10 events and in the top five in five events. Waller, meanwhile, averaged 88.18 and tallied four top 10's and three top 5's.	
	"Kelly and Kate give us a solid one-two combination at the top of our line-up," Carleton head coach Eric Sieger said. "The fact that they now have a year of college golf experience should help them immensely this year."	
	Carleton's top newcomer, Kassie Wells of Rochester (Minn.) Century HS, figures to fill one of the top three spots in Carleton's line-up. Wells is a three-time Minnesota Class AA state tournament qualifier and ranked eighth on the Minnesota PGA Players Tour points list last year.	
	"Kassie gives us another experienced, tested player at the top of our line-up," Sieger said. "We'll count on her to be one of our top players this year."	
	Carleton's lone senior, Katie Larson, returns for her fourth year and third as team captain. She's improved her stroke average by 10 shots from her first year. "If Katie can continue to make that type of improvement, we'll be a very competitive team this year."	
	Junior Laina Amerson and sophomore Lydia McClure, both of whom made huge improvements last season, will round out Carleton's line-up for 2003-04. Amerson and McClure both ended the season by recording a career-best round at the MWCGA State Tournament.

Season Preview:


There will be two major changes for the Concordia women's golf team. First and foremost is the absence of 23-year head coach Duane Siverson. In his place will be men's golf coach Troy Odegaard. Siverson will remain as an advisor to the team and be at the ready to offer swing tips and help with the grind of MIAC women's golf.

The second big change will be the role that the Cobbers will find themselves playing in the 2003 season. No longer are the Cobbers the favorite to hoist the team trophy at the end of the MIAC tournament. For the first time since the MIAC started women's golf, Concordia has not won the title in a span of two years.

The team is coming off its second consecutive third place finish and will have to replace four of the team's top five golfers. The lone returner is senior Katie Taylor who earned MIAC All-Conference honors in 2002 by finishing fifth at the conference tournament. Taylor was the owner of the team's low scoring average in 2002. Her 81.5 average was the lowest in her three years in maroon and gold. She should continue to compete for medalist in every tournament that the Cobbers compete and will be one of the favorites at the MIAC Championship Tournament in October.

The rest of the top five golfers will be filled out by the team's only other returning player, Katy Stevens, and a handful of first-year players. Stevens was the squad's sixth golfer in 2002.

Odegaard will have his hands full in 2003 if he wants to fill the giant spike marks left by Duane Siverson. If he can find a group of young golfers to develop thoughout the year, then he will be on his way to helping Concordia get back to the top of the MIAC.
