2016-17 MIAC Women's Hockey Conference Preview

BLOOMINGTON, Minn. – The puck is about to drop to start the 2016-17 Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) women's hockey season, and if it's anything like its predecessor, fans in the "State of Hockey" are in for a treat.

Parity reigned in the MIAC a year ago, evidenced by a pair of teams deadlocked at the top, sharing the conference title. Both St. Thomas (20-6-2 overall) and Bethel (15-10-2 overall) finished with 26 points and 12-4-2 MIAC records to share the crown, and just six points separated the top six teams in the standings.

For the Tommies, it was their fourth MIAC championship – second only to Gustavus' 13 – and second in three years after also winning in 2013-14. It was Bethel's first women's hockey conference championship in program history, and the Royals became just the fifth MIAC team to win a conference title, joining St. Thomas, the Gusties, Augsburg and Saint Mary's.

Fittingly, those two also met in the MIAC Playoff championship game for the second-straight season, and

St. Thomas scored in the third period to pull out a 2-1 win and a third-straight MIAC Playoff title. The Tommies were the MIAC's lone NCAA Tournament representative, where it fell to UW-River Falls.

Things were extremely tight behind the co-champs at the top of the 2015-16 standings. Augsburg had a breakthrough season, going 13-10-3 overall and 10-5-3 in the MIAC, and its 23 points were good for a third-place finish. Concordia (14-12-1, 11-7 MIAC) was just one point behind the Auggies in fourth at 22, and Saint Mary's (10-13-3, 9-7-2 MIAC) and Gustavus (9-11-5, 8-6-4 MIAC) shared fifth place with 20 points, with the Cardinals grabbing the fifth and final Playoff spot on tiebreaker criteria.

Hamline showed impressive improvement under first-year Head Coach Natalie Darwitz, as the Pipers finished seventh (9-13-3, 6-10-2, 14 points). Saint Benedict (7-15-3, 5-10-3, 13 points was just a point behind Hamline, and St. Catherine (6-14-5, 5-11-2, 12 points) came in just another point behind the Blazers. St. Olaf (2-21-2, 1-15-2, four points) rounded out the 2015-16 standings.

Expectations are high for another competitive season, as the gap between the conference's top and bottom appears to be continually shrinking. Plus, there's a lot of talent back around the league. The Tommies bring back MIAC Player-of-the-Year Kathryn Larson for her senior season, and 11 All-Conference picks and 14 All-MIAC Honorable Mention selections also return to put talent back on each roster.

With the increasing parity and returning star power, the first face-off can't come fast enough.

COACHES CAST THEIR VOTES

After last season's impressive 20-6-2 overall record and MIAC regular-season and Playoff titles, it's no surprise the conference coaches like St. Thomas' prospects of being on top again in 2016-17. UST was voted No. 1 in the annual MIAC Women's Hockey Preseason Coaches' Poll with eight first-place votes and 80 points. The Tommies are getting national attention as wlel, as they enter the season ranked No. 6 by USCHO.com and No. 8 by D3hockey.com.

The high hopes for Head Coach Tom Palkowski's club starts with the return of Larson, as the talented goal-scorer looks to repeat as MIAC Player-of-the-Year and garner even more All-American accolades. Sophomore goalie Kenzie Torpy is also back after going 20-4-2 in her collegiate debut season, and junior Allison Borgstrom return to anchor the blue line after earning Honorable Mention honors as a sophomore.

After sharing the MIAC title with the Tommies, the coaches expect Bethel to be right back in the thick of the championship picture, as the Royals were picked to finish second with 66 points, and they received votes in the USCHO.com national poll. Reigning MIAC Coach-of-the-Year Brian Carlson is glad to have All-MIAC forward Lauren Kolak back to lead his team, and they'll look for increased production from seniors Megan O'Brien and Hannah Williams in 2016-17.

Concordia also hopes to be in title contention in Head Coach Jason Gregoire's third season, as the Cobbers received 61 points to finish third in the MIAC Preseason Poll. All-MIAC forward Tori Davis – who led the league in goals in conference play – is back for her junior season, and



goalie Andrea Klug and forward Amber Schaack also return after earning All-Conference Honorable Mention honors a year ago, to give the Cobbers a strong, experienced nucleus.

Though Gustavus shockingly missed the Playoffs in 2015-16, coaches expect them to return to the Postseason and contention this season. The Gusties received the other two first-place votes in the Preseason Poll, and finished fourth with 60 points. Gustavus has a pair of talented junior forwards back in All-MIAC pick Erica Power and Diana Draayer, and Erin Moes is back on the blue line after a breakout rookie campaign.

Augsburg earned a trip to the MIAC Playoffs a year ago, and the coaches expect the Auggies to return to the postseason in 2016-17, as they finished fifth in the conference poll with 54 points. Augsburg has a strong group of skaters back, led by senior All-MIAC forward Callen Naasz, and both senior defender Danielle Heitkamp and sophomore forward Megan Johnson are back after earning All-Conference Honorable Mention honors.

Saint Mary's also has plenty of talent back in Winona, Minn., and the Cardinals were picked to finish sixth in the preseason poll with 40 points. All-MIAC junior forward Jamie Henderson is back after leading the team in goals and points, and a pair of talented seniors with Honorable Mention accolades – forward Kassie Lien and goalie Marah Shields – also return for Saint Mary's.

Hamline hopes to continue its rapid rise under Darwitz, as the Pipers finished six points back of the Cardinals in the preseason poll in seventh with 34 points. Hamline has a pair of seniors back to lead the way as the team hopes to work its way into postseason contention, with All-MIAC Honorable Mention picks Jena Kosley (forward) and Jaci Reinke (defense) both returning to St. Paul.

Saint Benedict was selected to finish eighth with 27 points in the MIAC Preseason Coaches' Poll, and appears to have all the pieces in place to keep making progress as well in 2016-17. Senior forward Elli Marvin – the team's leading scorer – returns for her senior season after earning All-Conference honors, and Honorable Mention picks Maddie Rainey (senior defender) and Brigette Miller (junior forward) are also back for the Blazers.

- St. Catherine received 18 points to finish ninth in the poll, and the Wildcats hopes started with decorated goalie Kristen Pechaceck, as the junior was an All-MIAC selection and a Second Team All-America pick as a sophomore. Forwards Laken Muller and Jordan Soheim are back to lead St. Kate's on the offensive end.
- St. Olaf rounded out the bottom spot in the coaches' poll with 10 points, but the Oles are hoping to show big improvement with a talented trio of scorers each with at least 13 points in 2015-16 back in Northfield, Minn. Senior defender Hannah Forliti was named All-Conference a year ago, junior Jane Vezina was an Honorable Mention pick, and senior Megan Skelly also provides scoring punch and leadership for St. Olaf.

With anticipation for the new season building to a fever-pitch, the time to drop the puck is almost here. The season opens Friday with six teams in action against nonconference foes, with the rest of the league opening their seasons within the next week. Conference play begins Friday, Nov. 11, and the regular season runs all the way through Saturday, Feb. 18. The MIAC Playoffs will be held over the following two weeks, with the champion advancing to the NCAA Tournament after that.
