

2004 MIAC WOMEN'S TENNIS PREVIEW

2004 marks the 23th Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Women's Tennis season. Teams will be attempting to challenge Gustavus Adolphus College for the top spot in the MIAC. Gustavus was perfect in the 2003 MIAC regular season, finishing 10-0, the Gusties have won eighteen of the twenty-two previous MIAC championships including the past twelve. Carleton, St. Thomas, St. Olaf, Saint Benedict and St. Catherine's finished close behind Gustavus and have young, but talented returning student-athletes looking to try and improve on their 2003 finishes. Bethel, Macalester, Concordia, Hamline and Saint Mary's all will look to improve and reach the upper half of the conference standings this year.

The MIAC Championships are scheduled for April 23 and 24 in Northfield, Minn, hosted by St. Olaf and Carleton.

Season Preview:

With five of six starters returning and a group of talented and accomplished newcomers entering the program, Carleton figures to continue its climb as one of the elite programs in the conference and region.

The Knights ranked fifth in the Central Region/Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) fall rankings, were 14-9 overall and 7-3 in the MIAC a year ago, finished the 2003 season ranked 34th in the nation and 12th in the Central Region.

Rising sophomore Sarah Russell posted a 16-7 mark as a rookie at the top spot but will miss the spring season due to injury after earning All-America honors in the fall. The Knights will lean on junior Genevieve Philp, who is 36-9 over the last two years, along with fellow junior and team co-captain Diane Danforth, who returns to the team after missing winter term studying abroad. Danforth and Philp are regionally ranked as a double duo. Rookie Abby Beggs and sophomore Eryn Koch will lend solid depth in the middle of the line-up. Newcomers Christina Walker and Golnaz Vayghan will likely hold down the fifth and sixth slots in the line-up. Sarah Hurst, last year's MIAC coach of the year, coaches the Knights.

She finished her first year of college tennis with a 5-9 record; teamed with Tollefson to record a 10-3 record at the number one doubles position. If bigger is better, then the 2004 Cobber women's tennis team will have all the earmarks for Season Preview: the best team in school history. The Concordia women's tennis team has the most players on their roster in school history. The Cobbers have a group of 15 players on the squad. Of those 15, nine are first-year players. The "baby" Cobbers will have a guiding light in number one singles player Erica Tollefson. Tollefson has played at the top spot in the lineup since she first stepped on the court at Concordia. She has posted a 17-12 mark in singles, and has helped the team's number one doubles team post a 22-7 record over her first three seasons. Joining Tollefson as the team's top returning player will be Beth Meier. Meier completed her first season of college tennis by posting five wins. More importantly, she teamed with Tollefson to give Concordia a force at the number one doubles spot. The tandem of Tollefson and Meier went 10-3 last year and should be back to once again give Concordia a go-to option to get team points. If associate head coach Paul Thibideau can harness the enthusiasm of the all the new players and mix in the talent of the upperclassmen, then Concordia will have a chance to break into the top five at the conference tournament. Season Preview:

Saint Mary's University tennis coach Jeff Halberg could hardly wait for the season to get underway. In fact, February 7, 2004, had probably been circled on his calendar for quite some time now.

For Halberg and the Cardinal men's tennis team, Feb. 7 — and their season-opening match against Macalester — was the start of what they are hoping is SMU's steady climb up the conference ladder.

The Cardinals are tired of being the understudy — it's time for them to take their turn in the spotlight.

"They've done all the (preseason) preparation — they have worked harder (in the off season) than any team I've had," said Halberg, whose teams opened with a pair of wins vs. the Scots in that season-opener. "They are ready to make that next step."

Are the Cardinals going to be battling perennial Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference powerhouse Gustavus for the conference crown? Probably not. But don't be surprised to see the Cardinals right in that group of teams in the middle-to-upper half of the MIAC.

"Right now (the men's team's) goal is to move into that top half of the conference," said Halberg, whose men's squad managed only a pair of conference wins a year ago — but did close out the season with a 6-2 victory over Bethel at the MIAC Tournament, and do return all but one starter off last year's squad. "It's going to be a battle, no question about that, but I really think that if we can get a few breaks, and win the close matches, we're definitely have the potential to make an impact this year."

Halberg isn't quite as optimistic on the women's side, although he does foresee a repeat of a year ago, when the SMU women went 9-13, including conference wins over Macalester, Hamline and Bethel (twice).

"We're not as deep, and we don't have quite as much experience on the women's side as we do on the men's," admitted Halberg, who not only graduated two regulars from a year ago, but also lost three underclassmen who are studying overseas this semester. "I've honestly been pleasantly surprised with how far along we are."

"It's nice that we do return some experience, but we are also going to be putting some of our freshmen to the test right away," continued Halberg. "Right now, I think that skill-wise, we are every bit as good as we were a year ago — if not maybe even a little better. But we aren't as experienced, and that will be the key.

"If we can put together a repeat of last year, I'd say that was a successful season."
