



2014 MIAC Women's Tennis Conference Preview

ST. PAUL, Minn. -- How times have changed. For two decades Gustavus ruled the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) women's tennis landscape. However, the last two seasons has produced two new regular-season champions in Carleton (2012) and St. Catherine (2013) and now there is a parity at the top of the standings that should make 2014 one of the conference's most exciting seasons to date.

Any of four contenders - the Gusties, Knights, Wildcats and St. Thomas - could all be considered the 2014





St. Olaf also finished above .500 in MIAC play a year ago at 6-4 (9-9 overall) to round out the top five of the conference standings, and Bethel was .500 (9-9 overall, 5-5 MIAC) in Head Coach Drew Fernelius' first season to join the Oles in the MIAC Playoffs. Saint Benedict (4-6 MIAC, 11-8 overall) finished above .500 overall, and missed a trip to the postseason by one game, with a seventh-place conference finish.

Macalester was 3-7 in conference play and 5-12 overall to occupy the No. 8 spot in the 2013 MIAC standings. Saint Mary's was tremendous in nonconference play, going 8-2 outside the league to finish 10-10 overall (2-8 MIAC). Hamline finished in 10th place (1-9 MIAC, 4-12 overall) and Concordia (0-10 MIAC, 0-16 overall) finished out the conference standings.

The parity that emerged over the past two seasons should get even better in 2013. Will St. Catherine defend its conference title? Did Carleton's postseason run prove the Knights are ready to re-claim the title? Will Gustavus end its two-year title drought and get back on top? Or will St. Thomas continue its progression all the way to the top of the standings? Can St. Olaf, Bethel or another contender join the title race as well? Finding out the answers to all these big questions should result in unforgettable matches and a banner season of women's tennis in the MIAC.

CARLETON EDGES TOMMIES ATOP THE POLL

The same parity unearthed on the court has also found its way into the preseason predictions, as the 2014 MIAC Women's Tennis Preseason Coaches' Poll results point towards a closely-contested season. The two teams that battled for the MIAC Playoff title a year ago received the 11 first-place votes and headline the poll, with Carleton selected to win its second title in three years on the strength of seven first-place votes and 97 points. However, St. Thomas is predicted to be in the mix for the title as well, with four first-place votes and 91 points to finish second in the poll.


Defending champion St. Catherine is expected to have another great season, as is Gustavus, with the Wildcats edging the Gusties for third place in the poll by just four points, 79-75. Fifth-place St. Olaf wasn't far behind that duo, receiving 67 points to round out the top five, and Saint Benedict and its 55 points complete the coaches' predictions for the six-team MIAC Playoff field.

Bethel received 44 points in the poll and is picked to finish just outside the postseason in seventh place. Macalester came in eighth with 37 points, with Saint Mary's just seven points back in ninth with a total of 30 for the Cardinals. Hamline (18 points) edged Concordia (12 points) by just six points to round out the top 10, as the Cobbers finished out the preseason predictions in 11th.

WHAT'S NEW?

There is one major change to the MIAC tennis landscape for 2014 - a new format for the MIAC Tennis Playoffs. Instead of a two-day tournament held on Gustavus' home courts, the tournament will now be a high-seed host event spread out over five days. The change will allow the top seeds to earn the right to host postseason matches on campus (or on their home courts), along with a day of rest between matches to benefit the student-athletes' well-being.

On the coaching front, there is one new face in the MIAC. Concordia hired Steve Futchko in the offseason to coach both the Cobber women and men. Prior to his new gig in Moorhead, Futchko served as the Director of Tennis for the Upland (Calif.) Tennis Club. Ironically, he was a standout player for Concordia University in Irvine, Calif.



Scott Nesbit remains the dean of MIAC women's tennis coaches, as he enters his 26th season coaching the St. Olaf women. Gustavus' Jon Carlson is starting his 24th season leading the Gusties. Terry Peck is beginning his 19th season at St. Thomas, and Saint Mary's Jeff Halberg is entering his 16th season leading the Cardinal women.

WHO'S BACK?

The Knights graduated All-America doubles player Bridget Doyle, but Head Coach Luciano Battaglini has plenty of talent back as Carleton tries to return to the top of the heap in the MIAC. Senior Anne Lombardi will try to cap her career with her fourth-straight All-MIAC singles and doubles honors, sophomore Mikayla Becich was an All-MIAC player and All-American in doubles in 2013, and senior Molly Hemes has earned multiple All-Conference honors in her career.

- St. Thomas also brings back an exceptional lineup, hungry for more success after the trip to the MIAC Playoff finals. Junior Kara Lefsrud will be counted on to lead Peck's 2014 squad, and a pair of sophomores Shelby Henderson and Bridget Noack are back and ready to build on the success they found as first-year players in the Tommies' lineup.
- St. Catherine was a tremendous story in 2013, rising all the way to the conference championship, and most of the Wildcats' lineup is back. Hageseth graduated MIAC Chris Evert Award winner Michaela Burroughs, but star senior Victoria Bravo and juniors Maria Koval and Kylie Ketcho will keep SCU in contention for the conference title again in 2014.

Gustavus graduated a pair of talented seniors in Heather Annis and Mallory Shellum, but Carlson has a trio of talented players back to make the 2014 Gusties a possibility to return to their championship ways. Junior Laurel Krebsbach is one of the MIAC's best and fellow junior Annie Mahoney is also back to help lead the way. Sidney Dirks was great in her college debut, and could be poised for even more success as a sophomore.

St. Olaf will again be in the MIAC Playoff hunt in Nesbit's 26th season. Alisa Hall emerged as the Oles' No. 1 singles player as a rookie and is ready to lead as a sophomore, and junior Kristi Kroker is also back to bolster the St. Olaf lineup. Saint Benedict's lineup returns largely intact, and Head Coach Scott Larsen hopes senior Jamie Hoffman, junior Ellie Black and sophomore Daley Rupar will be able to lead the Blazers back to the MIAC Playoffs after just missing out a year ago.

Fernelius will have to replace three key contributors from Bethel's 2013 Playoff run, but No. 1 singles/doubles star Abby Edin is back, along with fellow senior Amanda Johnson and junior Kristin Vivian to keep the Royals in contention for another trip to the postseason. Macalester graduated Paige Schaefer and her 39 career singles wins, but senior Carmen Whitehead and juniors Katelyn Glenna and Gabby Queenan are back to lead Head Coach Jason Muhl's talented, veteran lineup.

Saint Mary's hopes to build on last year's 10-win campaign, with senior Grace Zachman, junior Lindsey Reinisch and sophomore Katie Krull all back to lead the way. Hamline has three of its top four players back, as Head Coach Jon Henning hopes senior Carissa Wallerich and sophomores Cassie Rammage and Emily Butler can lead the Pipers into Playoff contention. Futchko will have a young team in his Cobber debut, but junior Kaitlyn Davies and sophomore Morgan Sawatzke will be equipped to lead the way after leading the team in singles victories in 2013.

CIRCLE THESE DATES

The first big MIAC women's tennis date arrived Jan. 29, as the 2014 season officially opened with eight of the conference's teams making their season debuts over the season's first four days. The MIAC season has also already begun, as Carleton defeated Saint Mary's 8-1 on Saturday (Feb. 1) to kick off the conference schedule.

The majority of the MIAC schedule will be played in April, with the regular season concluding on Sunday, April 27. The new-look MIAC women's tennis playoffs will begin with two quarterfinal matches on April 29. The two winners will advance to take on the No. 1 and 2 seeds in the semifinals on May 1, and the championship match will be played on the home court of the highest remaining seed on Saturday, May 3.

There are a few important early-season dates for teams hoping to show marked improvement in 2014. Concordia opens its season and Futchko makes his debut with a home MIAC match against Hamline Feb. 8 at 2:30 p.m. Hamline will square off against Saint Mary's on March 15 at 10:30 a.m. at the University of Minnesota's Baseline Tennis Center, and the Cardinals will face the Cobbers on the same court a day later, also at 10:30 a.m., to complete a crucial round-robin in the MIAC standings.

Many of the matches that will decide the conference championship and MIAC Playoff seeds will happen in a 10-day span in early April. Saint Benedict travels to St. Olaf for a 10:30 a.m. match on April 5 that could have major seeding or postseason bid implications. The MIAC Playoff championship rematch will take place on April 12 when St Thomas visits for Carleton for a 1 p.m. match that will be crucial to both teams' title hopes. Gustavus travels to St. Catherine the following day for another major MIAC showdown at 4 p.m., and Macalester will host Bethel on April 15 at 5:30 p.m. in a big match for teams with postseason aspirations.

2014 MIAC Women's Tennis Playoffs

The 2014 MIAC Tennis Playoffs received quite a makeover in the offseason. Instead of a two-day, single-site tournament, the Playoffs will now be spread out over five days with the top seeds hosting each round. The field will include the top six teams in the conference standings, squaring off in a single-elimination tournament. Teams seeded No. 3 through No. 6 will square off on April 29 in the quarterfinals, with the winners meeting the top two seeds in the semifinals on May 1. The championship match will be held May 3 on the home court of the top remaining seed. The winner will receive the MIAC's automatic bid to the 2014 NCAA Division III Women's Tennis Tournament.
