2016 MIAC Women's Tennis Conference Preview

BLOOMINGTON, Minn. -- For the last half-decade, women's tennis parity has been on the rise in the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC), and the result has been three different regular-season conference champions over the past three seasons. As the 2016 season begins, talent continues to spread across the conference and anticipation is high for another remarkably competitive season throughout the league.



After more than 20 years reigning atop the conference,

Gustavus saw its remarkable run end in 2012. However, 2015 signaled the return to the top of the standings for Head Coach Jon Carlson and the Gusties, as they ran the table with a perfect 10-0 MIAC record (16-13 overall) to capture the program's 27th conference title.

Gustavus became the third different team in as many years to win the league championship, as St. Catherine won in 2013 and Carleton was victorious in 2014. The parity didn't end there, as St. Thomas knocked off the Gusties in the MIAC Playoff championship match to earn the Tommies' first-ever MIAC women's tennis title of any kind and claim a spot in the NCAA Tournament field. UST was the runner-up in the regular season with a 9-1 record and a near-perfect 19-3 overall mark, with Carleton also in the mix as usual with an 8-2 record in conference play and a 14-4 mark overall.

In fact, the standings had perfect symmetry in 2015, with descending records all the way down from the top. St. Olaf's 7-3 (12-6 overall) was good for fourth place, St. Kate's was 6-4 (11-7 overall) in fifth and Saint Benedict finished sixth at 5-5 (8-12 overall). The Oles, Wildcats and Blazers all joined the Gusties, Tommies and Knights in the six-team MIAC Playoff field.

Bethel (4-6 MIAC, 12-9 overall) finished three matches over .500 but just missed out on a postseason bid. Saint Mary's was right behind the Royals at 3-7 (8-10 overall) and Hamline finished just a game behind the Cardinals in the standings (2-8 MIAC, 8-11 overall). Macalester (1-9 MIAC, 5-12 overall) and Concordia (0-10 MIAC, 2-13 overall) finished out the 2015 MIAC standings.

After decades of seeing the same team at the top, the parity that's emerged in recent years certainly adds more intrigue to the start of each season, with 2016 taking things to new levels of anticipation. Will Gustavus repeat in the regular season and embark on a new dynasty? Will the Tommies parlay their postseason success into their first-ever title. Will Carleton or St. Catherine make the move back to the top of the standings, or will another new contender emerge to spice things up even more?

With so many big questions looming at the start of the season, only one thing in crystal clear. In 2016, it will be advantage: MIAC.

THE POLLS ARE IN

According to the coaches' preseason predictions, MIAC women's tennis fans will be in for a treat again in 2016. The first-place votes are split almost evenly among the top two, with three different teams each receiving a first-place nod, and throughout the poll there are close totals indicating another highly competitive season on the courts across the conference.

St. Thomas was predicted to play its 2015 MIAC Playoff title into a regular-season conference championship in 2016, as the Tommies received six first-place votes and 96 points to sit atop the 2016 MIAC Women's Tennis Preseason Coaches' Poll. However, Gustavus is right on UST's heels and, according to the coaches, won't go down quietly in its regular-season title defense. The Gusties received four first-place votes and trailed St. Thomas by just three points with a total of 93. Carleton received the other first-place votes and 84 total points to round out a potent top three.

St. Olaf sits solidly in fourth with a total of 73 points, and St. Catherine edged Saint Benedict for fifth place - 60-to-56 - as the Wildcats and Blazers were picked to grab the final two MIAC Playoff spots by the conference coaches. Bethel (42) slipped past Saint Mary's (39) in a close vote for seventh place, and Macalester is just eight points behind the Cardinals at 31. Hamline (19) and Concordia (12) rounded out the final two spots in the standings.

PLAYERS TO WATCH

The Tommies enter the season as the MIAC favorite because of last season's success, and the talent coming back for Head Coach Terry Peck. Seniors Shelby Henderson and Bridget Noack are both three-time All-Conference selections, with a combined 70-29 singles record. Caitlin Bakke is back as well after going 17-4 and earning All-MIAC honors as a rookie in 2015.

Gustavus' hopes for a repeat title are high as well, with all but one significant contributor back in St. Peter this season. Junior Michaela Schulz is back atop of the Gusties lineup after receiving All-MIAC singles and doubles honors last season, and seniors Lizzy Stanczyk and Sid Dirks are also back to lead Gustavus again after earning All-Conference honors as juniors.

Both Northfield teams enter the 2016 with high hopes to continue contending, starting with Carleton, which is just one season removed from MIAC regular season and Playoff titles. The Knights' lineup returns intact, with All-MIAC seniors Mikayla Becich and Grace Davis leading the way and junior Caitlin Shea coming off an All-Conference singles and doubles season. St. Olaf brings back most of its talent as well, with All-MIAC senior Alisa Hall back, along with fellow senior Maya MacGibbon and sophomore Margaret Zimmerman.

St. Catherine graduated a pair of standout players in Maria Koval and Kylie Ketcho, but the team has plenty of veteran talent back for Eric Stacey, who resumes head coaching duties. Seniors Mikinzee Salo and Angie Lorenzen and junior Alicia Knoll all return with All-MIAC pedigree for the Wildcats. Saint Benedict has high hopes for another trip to the MIAC Playoffs as well with all but one key contributor back in Blazer-land. Senior Rachel Raden and junior Laura Finn both earned All-MIAC honors last season, and Victoria Beach also adds senior leadership to Saint Ben's squad in 2016.

Bethel hopes to build on its 12-win campaign behind a young, talented lineup. Sophomores Mattie Kidder and Anna Browning are expected to expand on their strong 2015 debuts, and first-year Sammi Hindt hopes to step in and contribute right away. Saint Mary's welcomes back nearly all its key players from a year ago, with talented juniors Haley Jorgensen and Megan Vandenberg both back, and senior Kirsten Hoffmann providing the leadership.

Macalester hopes for upward movement in the standings this year thanks to the return of junior Gabi Rivera and the sophomore duo of Lily Stein and Maegan O'Herin. Hamline has most of its talent back, and juniors Lili Denison and Jordan Danielson and senior Emily Butler all return to lead the Pipers in 2016. Concordia is another team with all its top talent back, as senior Brittany Glatt returns to the No. 1 singles spot for the third-straight season, and junior Jade Haseltine will again slot in right behind her at No. 2.

CIRCLE THESE DATES

Fortunately for fans, the anticipation is over. The spring season actually began officially on Jan. 29, and the first MIAC contest of the season - an 8-1 win for Carleton over Saint Mary's - followed on the next day. Things really begin in earnest Friday and Saturday, with numerous teams opening their season. Despite Mother Nature's winter influence on Minnesota this week, the MIAC teams will take to the indoor courts around the areas and embark on trips to warmer locales to complete a significant number of matches in February and March.

However, the bulk of the conference season will be played in April. Each Saturday in April features ample conference matches. Hopefully, knock on wood, spring has sprung by then and the big questions surrounding the MIAC championship and six MIAC Playoff spots can be answered on the outdoor courts around the league. April 2, 9, 16, and 23 are four of the busiest days for league play, with mid-week matches also prevalent throughout the month.

The final regular-season matches are set for Saturday, April 30, at which time the regular-season champ will be crowned and the conference will announce the six-team Playoff field. The tournament will take place with two quarterfinal matches on Tuesday, May 3, two semifinal matches on Thursday, May 5, and the championship on Saturday, May 7. The winner of the MIAC Playoffs will receive the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA Division III Women's Tennis Tournament.

2016 MIAC Women's Tennis Playoffs

The 2016 MIAC Tennis Playoffs will mark the third-straight season of the new tournament format, which has top seeds hosting each round over the course of the five-day Playoffs. The field will include the top six teams in the conference standings, squaring off in a single-elimination tournament. Teams seeded No. 3 through No. 6 will square off on May 3 in the quarterfinals, with the winners meeting the top two seeds in the semifinals on May 5. The championship match will be held May 7 on the home court of the top remaining seed. The winner will receive the MIAC's automatic bid to the 2016 NCAA Division III Women's Tennis Tournament.
